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"I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States and the country for which it stands. One nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

In A. J. Smith's speech of acceptance he took a stand for State Rights regarding the liquor question. The question of State Rights was settled once and for all by the great Civil War. He also stated that he stood for an honest effort to enforce the 18th amendment. If he is honest in this he will have a hard time making the people believe it. The New York legislature passed a bill which, in effect, ignored the 18th amendment. This bill was signed and became a law. Since that time there has been no enforcement of the liquor laws in New York except by Federal officers. This is hardly consistent with the utterances of his acceptance speech. Governor Smith is backed by Tammany Hall, an organization that has been against prohibition and has left a record of corruption throughout its history. The Encyclopedia Britannica, the most unbiased of all, says, of Tammany Hall, that "it has been actively engaged in politics, being part of, and during the greater period of its existence, actually representing, in New York City, the Democratic party, though always subordinating interests of the party, as a whole, to its own selfish interests." The Standard Reference work says, Tammany has a reputation of governing New York corruptly by a double method of levying on the public purse and by pleasing the lower classes of society. Hill's Practical Reference Library says of the Tammany bosses, "The most notorious of these bosses was William M. Tweed, whose gigantic frauds, and those of the ring of which he was chief, were finally exposed in 1871. Tweed was convicted and died in jail while suits were pending against him for the recovery of \$6,000,000." And he was boss of that grand organization, Tammany Hall. The Standard Educational Work says of "Boss" Tweed, "He was noted for letting corrupt contracts for paving and other city improvements. He began a courthouse to cost \$250,000 and spent \$8,000,000 long before it was completed." And further, "Tweed's name is synonymous for dishonesty in public life." The defense of Tammany Hall, some of the strong supporters of Governor Smith is that "any organization that has stood for 141 years must be good." Undisputed history as quoted above shows that Tammany Hall has stood for corruption in all branches of city government; and Governor Smith says he is proud of his membership in this organization. We cannot believe he is the choice of the rank and file of the Democratic party, even though he is the Democratic candidate.

The treaty to outlaw war has been signed by representatives of 15 nations with Germany leading the list. This speaks well for the new German republic. If this spirit continues she will soon lose the name of being a warlike nation. When a nation becomes a republic and the people have more or less say in governmental matters, warlike ideas cease. With the signatures of 15 of the greatest nations of the world affixed to the document it begins to look as though universal peace was drawing nearer.

Hoover's prospects in the South are good, according to a statement by Mrs. Jesse M. Nicholson, of Chevy Chase, Maryland, president of the National Women's Democratic Law Enforcement League, at a meeting in Birmingham, Alabama, recently. She said: "Only two southern states, South Carolina and Louisiana, are doubtful; the others will be overwhelmingly for Herbert Hoover next November as a protest against Governor Smith's prohibition record." Mrs. Nicholson added the entire West to the southern states as strongholds for Hoover that would give him "approximately ten million votes" over the New York governor.

## GRASS FIRE MONDAY

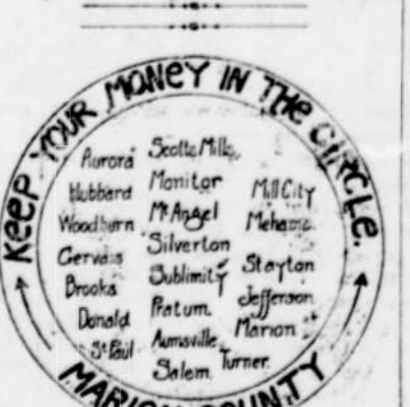
