Because we did not see fit to publish a letter received from the Catholic Truth Society of Oregon, criticising one of our recent editorials, and containing some statements which we did not believe coincided, altogether, with historical facts, we were circled in this community by this organization. We frankly state that we appreciate it very much. It was the finest piece of advertising we have had since we have been in Turner.

This circular tries to prove their loyalty to the government. We are not contradicting the loyalty of individuals. We know from our experience in the world war that there were many loyal members of the Roman Catholic church in the army. But there is one question that is not altogether clear to us and that is how can they reconcile their attitude toward the American public school system with loyalty to the government. The public school is the greatest bulwark of American ideals of democracy and should have the undivided support of every loyal citizen.

VETERAN REPUBLICAN GOING INTO ACTION

The wheel-horse pulls a good load. Republican leaders will receive with satisfaction the announcement that Wesley L. Jones, United States senator from Washington, has fully recovered from his recent illness, and is now ready to throw himself into the Hoover-Curtis campaign with characteristic vigor.

Senator Jones is a good Republican, is chairman of the important commerce committee of the senate, and extremely influential both in the capital and in Washington state. He is interested in all legislation, but he pays particular attention to shipping, and he was an active worker for Mississippi flood control.

Senator Jones' contacts with Herbert Hoover in connection with recent relief work have increased his already enthusiastic admiration for the Republican candidate. He should pull a good load for Hoover and Curtis in the campaign work of the next two months.

A news item appeared in the Salem Capital Journal of September 12 under the heading "Oregon People Slow to Move," which should spur up those who are slow to register. According to figures compiled by Secretary of State Koser showing that only 316,113 persons have registered to date, as against 359,236 registered before the general election two years ago. The registration this year, so far, is 43,123 less than the registration two years ago with less than a month in which to register. The new registration shows 221,465 republicans, 82,962 democrats, 552 progressives, 842 prohibitionists, 1275 socialists and 9017 miscellaneous. Every voter should register and go to the polls and vote for someone.

LEGION REQUESTS VOTERS REGISTER Non-partisan advice to all voters to make sure prior to October 6 that they are legally registered, is contained in a resolution passed by the members of Capital Post No. 9, American Legion, released for publication Saturday by H. G. Maison, commander of the post. The resolution reads as follows: "Whereas, It has been brought to the attention of the American Legion, a patriotic organization, that several thousand voters within Marion county will be deprived of the right to vote at the general election, November 6, because of improper registration; and "Whereas, It is not generally known that those voters who have moved from one precinct to another, those who have failed to vote for the past two years, and those who have changed their names by marriage, must re-register with the county clerk or his duly appointed registrars on or before October 6 next, in order to be again eligible to vote.
