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"I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States and the country for which it stands. One nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

One of the most famous of western pioneers and a man who probably did more to develop the Oregon country than any other pioneer even after the great territory, which at one extended from the Canadian line to California, was divided into the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, is fast approaching the time when he will take the last long trail. Ezra Meeker, the 97 year old pioneer, who came to this country by ox team when a small boy is lying at death's door, in Seattle, Mt. Meeker saw the great cities of Puget Sound and the inland empire grew from the wilderness. He saw the wilderness of the west, inhabited by roving tribes of Indians, developed into a rich industrial and agricultural section supporting millions of people. More than twenty years ago Ezra Meeker launched a campaign to mark the "Old Oregon Trail" as a monument to these hardy pioneers who braved the dangers and made the long trip across the continent to make their homes in this new country. In order to get this move started he made a trip over the old trail, this time going from the west to the east ending his trip in New York city. Only a couple or so years ago he made this same trip by airplane piloted by Lieut. Oakley Kelley. Many of the people of Oregon can remember going to the county fairs and seeing this aged gray haired pioneer sitting there with his ox team and never tiring of explaining pioneer adventures on the old trail to the children and older folks, as well. Not many days hence Ezra Meeker will be leaving this great section of the United States which he helped to develop with consciousness of work well done. His will be a name that will never be erased from the memory of the western country.

Since writing the above article Ezra Meeker said farewell to the great western empire that knew him from the earliest stages of its development. He passed into the great beyond at 4:05 Monday morning, at Seattle Washington. He was nearly 98 years old but his spirit was as youthful as that of the Ohio boy who set his feet westward 76 years ago. His funeral was held at Puyallup, Washington, his old home. He was laid to rest beside his wife who died in 1909.
