The 1929 session of the Oregon legislature convened Monday for their regular 40 to 60 day session. There will probably be the usual interchange of hot air with some real business done. There will probably be some work done that will be for the good of the state. No doubt the usual Multnomah county lobbyist will be present to railroad through some pet bills of a personal nature. They will probably vote the \$5.00 a day expense money the same as they did last year. If they would confine their energy on the adjusting of the automobile licenses, the necessary appropriations, and the repealing of a few hundred useless laws that are now on the statutes and adjourn in two weeks they would have done a great service to the state. But to drag on for forty or sixty days and pass some hundred more laws to go with the multitude we already have is a useless waste of the taxpayers money. A good way for these servants of the people to put in their time would be to simplify some of the numerous laws we now have so the average citizen will be able to understand them and be better able to abide by them. Since the recent air test when the army plane Questionmark remained in the air and refueled while flying for more than 112 hours, some other aviators are getting nervous and are planning for more records. Martin Jensen, Dole race Hawaiian flier and Emil Burgin are to make a try-again attempt to establish a new solo endurance flight record and bring the world non-refueled-grown back to the United States next week. Jensen will go up first and stay as long as the plane will hold out and then, after the plane is repaired Burgin will go up and see if he can do better. When he is through if a new world record is not achieved both men will go aloft together in a final attempt. The solo record in this country was held by the late Royal V. Thomas who remained in the air 35 hours and 36 minutes. Jensen and Burgin are going to attempt to beat the German record of Johan Ristetz and Wilhelm Zimmermann of 65 hours and 25 minutes. Here's hoping they succeed.

Two dead, two critically injured and in Portland hospitals as the result of a liquor party. Lyle Wilson, driver of the death car is in jail facing a charge of manslaughter. According to Wilson's friends he was industrious and had not been known to drink. He met two young men by accident. These men after quite an effort persuaded Wilson to go with them and have a few drinks. After drinking some beer and a pint of moonshine they were feeling gay and decided to go to the Errol Heights Live Wire club community dance where they met their companions in the death ride. They finally persuaded Mrs. Bernice Seymour, aged 21, and Miss Elsie Gibson, age 17, to ride home with them. Wilson only remembers opening the throttle of his car to the limit and then followed the crash that sent Mrs. Seymour and Theodore Buskohl into eternity, and three

others to the hospital. Here is a young man with the best of his life before him facing ruin. He had a bright future, a good position and in line for substantial promotion. He was looking on a bright picture of the future. The scene was changed in the twinkling of an eye. Now he is looking on a dark picture. He is facing a charge of manslaughter. Under the law he is guilty. Morally it was not the intent of the young man to commit this deed. His brain was fogged by the liquor and he did not know what he was doing. Such things as these should be a warning to other young men as to the dangers brought on by liquor. Prior to Saturday Wilson was regarded as a model young man. Monday he was classed as a criminal.

Mrs. L. E. Petersen was a business visitor in Salem Saturday evening.

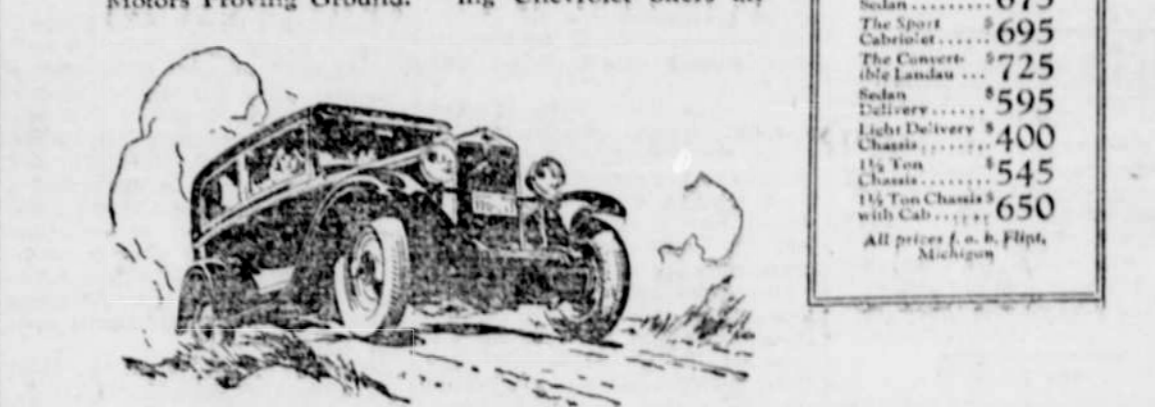
