STRONG FOR PROHIBITION

The temper of the nation towards the 18th amendment and its enforcement is fairly well reflected in the senate's vote to increase maximum fines for prohibition law violation from \$1000 to \$10,000 for the first offense, with maximum prison sentences stretched from six months to five years. The bill passed by a vote of 65 to 18 despite the invectives of Senator Reed and Senator Bruce.

The country, it would seem, is not in the least convinced that prohibition has utterly failed but rather that it has not been fairly tried. Senator Borah rightfully asks that the great "experiment" be fully tested before it be condemned.

Incidentally the split of votes reveals that 36 republicans and 29 democrats joined in approving the passage of this drastic measure. Herein is exposed a fatal weakness of the democratic party in 1928. Mr. Smith considered that New York's experience with prohibition was typical and that the demands of Broadway were those of Main street. Twenty-nine democrats voting for stringent increases in prohibition penalties belie his judgment.—Oregon Statesman.

The tireless effort the Senator L. McNary has been putting forth in the interest of an adequate channel in the Willamette river from Portland is beginning to bear fruit. He has been working toward getting a mobile edge stationed on the Willamette to take care of the channel work between Portland and Salem. The people of the Willamette valley are now assured through Senator McNary that

there will be a permanent channel in the Willamette. This will mean much to the future commerce of the valley. It will reopen the commerce on the river and who knows but what boats will be again running to Independence as in the years gone by. Through the efforts of Senator McNary the board of engineers have begun the preparation of plans for a dredge for the river and in the meantime have ordered the district engineer to restore the depth of channel either by contract or government plan of both.

The ultimate of the engineers is to construct a series of wing dams which by being placed at proper intervals will catch the sediment and turn the water to the center of the river thereby holding the water at a better depth. This cannot be done without the establishment of regular navigation and heavier tonnage. If the channel is kept at a depth safe for navigation the year around this will be rapidly developed. There is looming in the near future the busy hum of river navigation that is only a memory with the older residents of the valley.

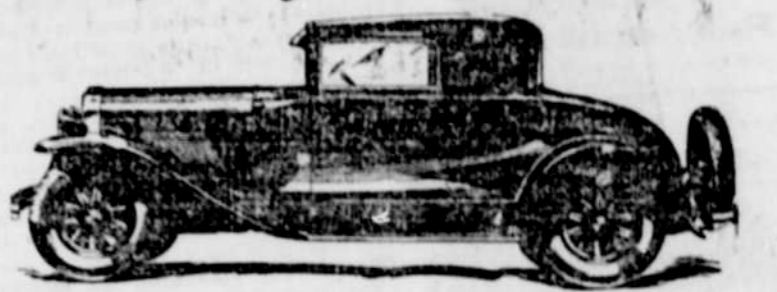
There will be a basketball game here Friday night, March 1, with Parrish Junior Hi.
