## Who Discovered America?

There have been many ideas put forward, from time to time regarding the discovery of America, each author bringing proof from various sources to prove his claim. Some authorities claim that Amerigo Vesputri was named for America Vesputri for the reason that he was supposed to be the first explorer to land on the main land of American continent. Some historians claim Columbus as the discoverer of America.

The Nordic race, through their legends and manuscripts, claim the honor should have gone to Leif Ericson and that the continent was named for his father, Eric the Red. The yargue that "Am" in Norwegian means "land" hence "Land" of "Eric" and eventually America.

Decendants of the Vikings, in Wisconsin, in which state there are many, argue that Eric has as good a claim to the discovery of America as Columbus, Eric the Red founded a Norse settlement in Greenland about 985. This was a permanent settlement which existed about 400 years or until about the year 1355, about 107 years prior to Columbus' voyage of discovery. Like Columbus Eric the Red founded his colony on an island and not on the main land.

About the year 1000 Leif Ericson, son of Eric the Red, sailed from Iceland to a point on the main land of North America, presumably the coast of Labrador, which he called Vinland because the great quantities of luscious wild grapes that abounded. Not much is known about the colonization efforts except what is recorded in the Icelandic Sagas, as their historical manuscripts are called. All of these discoveries were made and recorded more than 300 years prior to the discovery credited to Christopher Columbus.

The question of the discovery of America, like many other great historical questions will never be thoroughly settled. Personally we favor the honor going to the memory of Eric the Red and his son, Leif Ericson, because of their discoveries and colonizing efforts pre-dating those of Columbus by several hundred years.
