## Tyrants Never Learn

Dictators never learn. For this let us give thanks, for if absolute monarchs could learn, freedom would indeed become a fantasy. Now it is Mussolini, the uncrowned emperor of Italy.

Students of the University of Turin have been deported or sent to the penal islands without a trial and without any legal rights whatsoever—for failing to sign a statement disagreeing with fascism. Members and officials of Masonic lodges the few who have survived the dictator's displeasure being hunted down by secret agents and either kicked out of the country or sent to starve on the dread barren islands where the chief of the blackbirds keeps those who have courage enough to disagree with him.

Great has been the rise of Mussolini. Under the arbitrary rule, Italy has prospered materially just as France prospered during the days of Napoleon's triumphs.

But, Dictators never learn. They always kindle and feed the fires that eventually consume them.

Mussolini cannot destroy liberty in Italy. He may hunt it down, he may deport or imprison all who believe in human rights and human liberty. But he cannot assassinate an idea, a principle. The idea will live; it will still be a flag around which the oppressed may rally long ages after Mussolini has become merely one of the great tyrants of history. —Portland Daily News.
