Does This Build Law Respect?

A county prosecutor called the defense attorney a coward.

He was told in reply that he was a liar.

This was countered, from the defense, with an accusation that the prosecutor was a wife-deserer.

The fire department was accused by the defense of being crooked.

The department retaliated with the statement that the defense counsel was a liar.

Oh, sure there was a regular trial going on. Somebody was being tried for arson, a fairly serious offense and one that the average citizen would imagine might have been approached in an orderly way.

This newspaper believes that such sad exhibitions in courtrooms do more to dishonor the courts than anything else.

As long as courts are conducted as vaudeville shows they will be regarded as such by the rest of us. No citizen can—or should—be expected—to respect something that moves him to garrulous laughter.

Fire Damage Decreases

The damage to the timber from forest fires has been on the decrease the last few years, although the loss has been heavy. There is still room for improvement. Extra care should be used in extinguishing camp fires. The U. S. Forest Service extends camping privileges in the forest reserves and tourists should show their appreciation for these privileges by using care in building and extinguishing camp fires and with cigars cigarettes or pipe. Forest fires on the national forests of Washington and Oregon have burned over the on average of 70,000 acres per year during the past five years.

A growing spirit of cooperation on the part of the public, better organization, and quicker action are responsible for this excellent showing, local forest officers state. At the same time they point out that even 70,000 burned over acres per year is too high. From 60% to 70% of forest fires are man-caused, and campers and smokers head the list of man-causes. If these man-caused fires could be entirely eliminated the total burned would be even smaller, it is said.—Western Out-Of-Doors.

Even though this reduction of fire loss in our forests has been brought about, we should not cease to educate the camper and tourist as to care of fires, cigarette, and cigar stubs and pipe ashes. A few important rules are published in the current issue of the Western Out-Of-Doors under the heading, Six Rules For Fire Prevention. They are as follows: 1. Matches. Be sure your match is out. Break it in before you throw it away. 2. Tobacco. Be sure that pipe ashes and cigarette and cigar stubs are dead before you throw them away. Never throw them into brush, leaves or needles. 3. Making Camp. Before building a fire, scrape away all flammable material from a spot 5 feet in diameter. Dig a hole in the center and in it build your fire. Keep your fire small. Never build it against trees or logs, or near brush. 4. Breaking Camp. Never leave until your fire is out—dead out. 5. Brush Burning. Never burn slash or brush in windy weather or while there is slightest danger that the fire will get away. 6. How to Put Out a Camp Fire. Stir the coals while soaking them with water. Turn the stick and logs and drench both sides. Wet ground around fire, soak and feel with the fingers for live embers around the edges. The only way to put out a camp fire is to drown it until there is not one solitary live spark left. Be sure the last spark is out.—Joe D. Guthrie.

Marion County Claims Air Ace

The country at large has passed through several spells of elation over great achievements in the air. Trans-Atlantic flights including Col. Lindbergh, flights to Hawaii, inurance records and re-fueling records, all in the space of a year. At 2:13 P. M., July 12 the world was introduced to another age of the air when Roland P. Reichert, of Salem and his companion flier, Loren W. Mendell, of Los Angeles completed their re-fueling and endurance flight, smashing all previous records. They

were in the air 210 hours, 45 minutes and 32 seconds, exceeding the previous record by 72 hours, 42 minutes and 23 seconds. This brings Salem and Marion county, and Los Angeles county to the front in air records, for in our estimation of our local flier's record we must not forget that his companion is entitled to equal honors in this record breaking achievement.
