The fire was discovered by a passing motorist who stopped in Turner and gave the alarm. Several of the town people went to the scene of the fire and with the use of chovels and backfires the blaze was soon corralled and extinguished with practically no damage done to an old rail fence along the field.

Some of the poles belong to the Pacific Telephone and Telephone Co., caught fire. They were notified and a man was soon on the job with a pyrene extinguisher, to look after them. Some of the hay in the field, belonging to A. E. Robertson was thought for a while to be in danger but the stubble was not heavy enough to carry the fire thereby saving the hay.
