Turner Girl Killed By Truck

Turner and the entire community were saddened Saturday afternoon by the tragic death of little Evelyn Bones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. V. N. Bones. The little girl was playing across the street from the house when she started for home. According to reports, she dodged another car and ran in front of a heavily loaded wood truck which knocked her to the ground and crushed her to death. The accident was said by eyewitnesses to be unavoidable. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the Rigdon mortuary with the interment in Bell Crest Memorial cemetery. Conducted by Rev. Earl Cochran, of Calvary Baptist church. The little girl was a friend of everyone and a ray of sunshine to every one she met and the bereaved parents have the sympathy of the entire community.

Alsea Bay Gives Fine Fishing

The Editor of the Tribune, Kenneth Petersen, of the office and Gerald Given motored to Waldport, on the Alsea Bay, last Thursday night, and remained until Sunday night. The time was spent enjoying the fine fishing that prevails on the bay. The tom-cod were running and more than a hundred were caught in less than an hour. Flounders and other bay fish were numbered among the catch. The trip into the Alsea bay country is very enjoyable one with the fine roads. From the junction with the Newport highway to the Alsea highway is surfaced and oiled to Alsea and oiling operations are in progress from there to Waldport. They are being carried on in such a manner as to cause no difficulty to motorists.

Construction work on the Roosevelt highway is in progress through Waldport at the present time but it will be some time before the road is completed. A large sea wall is under construction from the edge of the Keady camp ground along the beach to point of rocks marking the mouth of the Alsea Bay to protect the highway grade from the tide. This will cost upwards of \$70,000. The present plans call for a bridge over the bay that will be more than 3,500 feet long. A 200 foot span in the center will have a clearance of 50 feet and the balance will be a concrete viaduct. With the completion of the highway Waldport will be one of the most important summer resorts along the beach. The highway coupled with the fine drive down the beach past San Marine the new resort being developed by Dr. Linton, of Waldport, will draw hundreds of tourists to the Waldport section.

There is a fine camp ground right on the beach near the mouth of the bay owned and operated by W. F. Keady which is rapidly becoming known to the traveling public. The owner takes pride in accommodating his guests and making them comfortable. He is always out around the camp looking after the comforts of the campers. This fact alone makes one want to go again. The merchants of the town do not practice the usual holdup game that is in vogue in most of the beach resorts. Supplies can be purchased practically as cheap as in the valley towns. If you want to enjoy a pleasant outing on bay and beach go to Waldport, on the Alsea bay.

Turner Resident Passes After Five Months Illness

Hans Friederich Gath, resident of the Turner district for a number of years, died at the family residence here Tuesday night, after an illness of nearly five months duration. Gath was born in Holstein, Germany, October 13, 1861, and had lived in America since 1888. Besides his widow Christina, he is survived by three children; Arthur, Olga and Edward, all of Turner; a brother and sister in Germany; and two other sisters: Mrs. John Ahrens of Turner and Mrs. Mary Huff of Council Bluffs, Iowa. Funeral services have not yet been arranged. Remains are at the Rigdon mortuary here.—Statesman.
