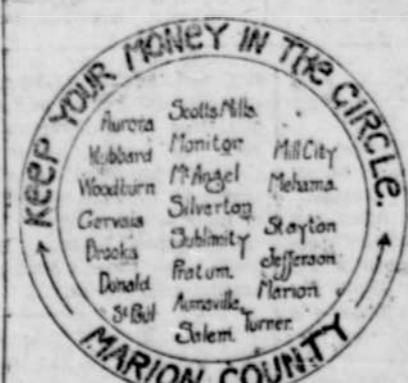
Party At Rowley Home
