## "Return from Vacation trip to Alaska"

Mrs. U. S. Talbott and Miss Lucile Riches have returned from a very enjoyable and interesting Cruise to Alaska on board the S. E. Dorothy Alexander. The points of interest visited after sailing from Seattle, Wash. were Victoria B. C. Sitka, Skagaway, Juneau, The Taku Glacier, Wrangell and Ketchikan Alaska. Sitka is the most picturesque of all the Alaskan towns visited with its beautiful open harbor, native population and many Indian Totem poles. Juneau is the seat of the territorial Government and the most modern city with a population of some six thousand people, mostly white.

The trip from Skagaway up the old Yukon trail over a narrow gauge railroad to White Pass the summit of the mountains and also the Boundary line between Canada and Alaska was reached then on to Lake Bennett, Canada where a delicious Moose meat dinner was served to all the passengers of the train at noon. From Skagaway to Lake Bennett a distance of forty one miles is traveled and an altitude of from two to three thousand feet above sea level is reached. The railroad is built along the mountains with a five to seven per cent grade and is a very scenic route with its rugged mountains and deep canyons.

Prize picking will start about Friday or Saturday in this community.

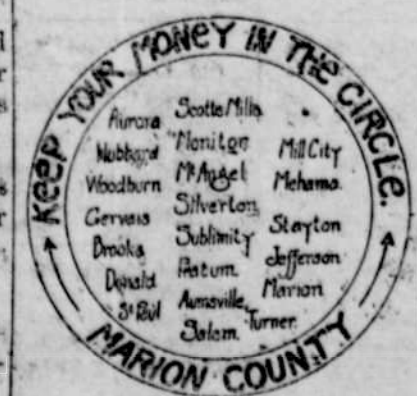
