New Berry

A new blackberry has recently been put on the market here for the first time. It is an improved variety and is the creation of Dell Harrington, who lives east of town. The berry is 10 to 20 per cent sweeter than other blackberries and tests 10.45 sugar. They are fine fresh for the table. They have no core, but few seeds and these are small. The berries make excellent jam and Jelly.

Just the last finishing touches remain before the opening, September 23.

Running and harness races every afternoon, interspersed with vaudeville and acrobatic acts, and the horse show every night promise thrills in plenty.
