It is so made that it is absolutely solid and prevents weed or other trash accumulating between the canvas and strips. Mr. Bartoz also has another exhibit in the shape of a fulcrum hammer. This hammer has a block built in the head which is forced out by means of a screw which forms a fulcrum to pry over when pulling nails. This exhibit will be found at the west end of the automobile building. Mr. Bartoz, president and D. F. LAST RITES FOR JOSEPH BESSE HELD MONDAY

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock in the Rigdon chapel in Salem for Joseph Randolph Besse.

Joseph Randolph Besse was born August 25, 1843, at Dupage, Ill., Will county, and died September 19, 1928, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. L. Bones in Turner, at the age of 85 years and 25 days, after a lingering illness. He was united in marriage December 2, 1868, to Callie Munson, who died in November, 1927.

To this union was born seven children, of which four are living. Mr. Besse had been a resident of Turner for 36 years. Surviving are two daughters: Mrs. A. L. Bones of Turner and Mrs. T. M. Gook of Helix; two sons, Clarence R. Besse and George A. Besse of Portland; two grandchildren. Interment was in Lincoln Memorial park in Poyland.

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
