### Champoeg Memorial

The agitation is still on to ask the federal government for aid in building the Champoeg memorial. The telegram has been fighting for a memorial built from funds raised at home. This can be done. The honor belongs to the west and to that part of the west that comprises the original Oregon Territory which is Oregon, Washington and Idaho. It was the pioneers of this section that afterwards became three of the most prosperous states of the Pacific Northwest. Why appeal to Washington for federal aid? Why not raise the money at home and build a memorial typical of the west as it was in the early day? No matter what the style of building make it to represent some structure of pioneer days. Then, when it is built, use it to house the Oregon historical museum and library. What would be more fitting than to have the Oregon historical Society located in a prominent building on the site of the birth of the Oregon Territory. We would suggest that a meeting of the representative citizens be called to meet at some central place and perfect an organization for this purpose. The memorial can be built without outside help.

### Unsightly Advertising

The Standard Oil Company has started a campaign to eliminate unsightly advertising from the highways and to prevent further maraging of the scenic beauty of the Pacific coast. This is a very good idea and should have the support of every citizen of the state. In Oregon and Washington there is now a law prohibiting the placing of advertising signs along the highways. The law does not interfere with signs placed on private property. It is left to public sentiment to eliminate these. In many places the large gaudy sign boards not only mar scenic beauty of the highway but they are a menace to careful driving as many times they hide dangerous curves and are a mere or less indirect cause of accidents along the highways, not only by hiding a dangerous curve but by attracting the driver's attention off the road. One wealthy eastern tourist remarked during his trip that if they would remove the large gaudy bill boards from the highways the wonderful scenic beauties could be enjoyed. The tourist does not drive over the western highways to view signs advertising 57 varieties of come manufactured products but to see the beauties of the country through which he travels.

A timely editorial in a recent issue of the Portland Daily News dealing with the issue of bill boards ends with this paragraph: "There is a place for the signboard in the economic scheme of things, but its place is not on the highway."

### Science May Make The Blind See

Talking pictures for the deaf! This is the latest trick of wizardry that has come from the electrical laboratory. Theaters of the future will offer this additional service to patrons suffering from deafness. Special seats equipped with earphones which will enable the deaf to hear will be provided. A special panel to furnish the words and music directly from the main amplification unit in the theater will enable the deaf patrons of the theater to hear every word spoken by the screen players.

The next step? To make it possible for the blind to see.

Impossible? Listen: The nervous system reacts to certain vibrations now little understood. The optical nerve may some day react to radio so that the blind may see. We may even taste and smell by radio. Science is opening a tremendous field as yet scarcely touched.
