You can think as you please about the rights and wrongs of the Carolina textile strike. Certainly there are two sides to it. But for the fogging of the strike leaders and the killing of a defenseless woman there is not a shadow of a defense.

What is more important is the fact that this mob violence will do more to win converts to the communist banner than anything else that could have happened. The ignorant fanatics who are responsible are playing directly into the hands of the strikers. —Portland Daily News.

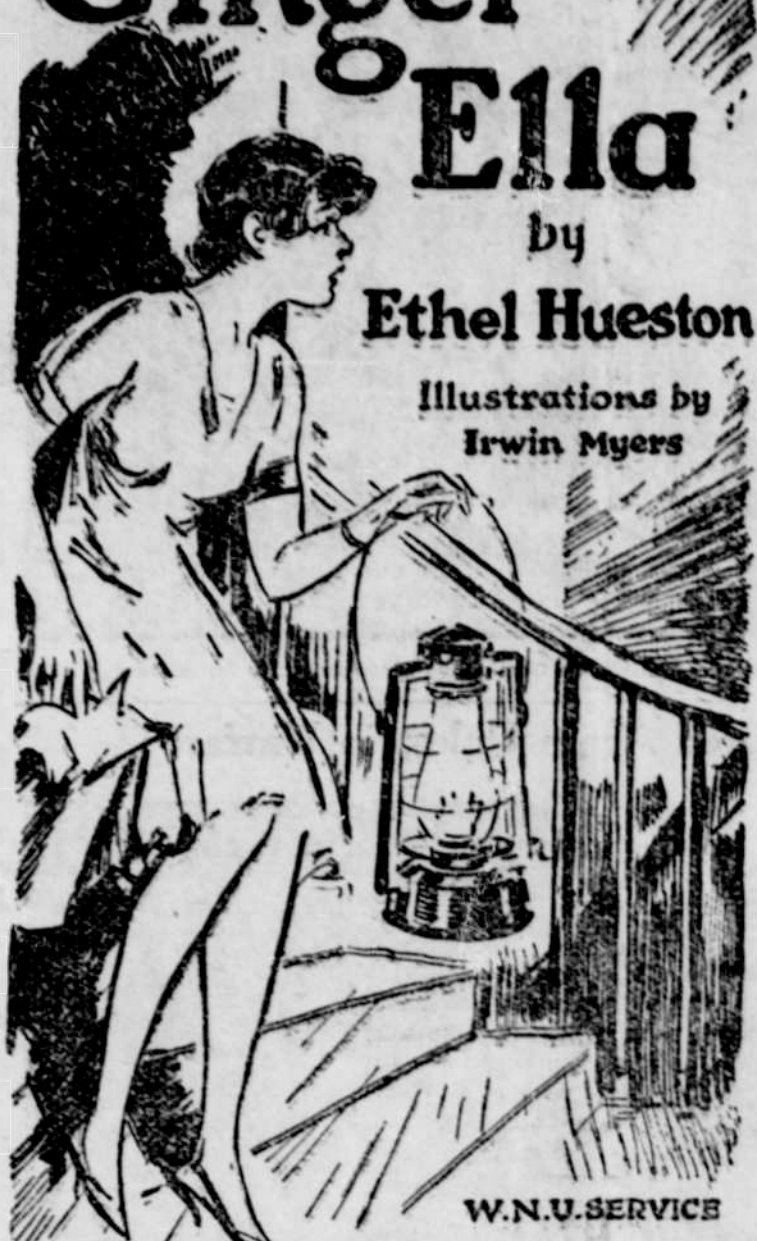
