All of Mr. and Mrs. Hunsaker's seven children and the majority of their 13 grandchildren were present for the occasion. The honor guest at the anniversary celebration was Mrs. Hunsaker's 86 year old cousin, Mrs. M. Darrah, who came up from Los Angeles for the affair. Mr. Hunsaker's two sisters Mrs. O. M. Reeves, of Salem and Mrs. J. C. McKern, of Yamhill and Mrs. Hunsaker's sister Mrs. M. M. High, of Salem were present for the anniversary.

George Washington Hunsaker is the son of pioneer parents who crossed the plains in 1846 and took up land in Yamhill county and Mattie Nelsos, daughter of A. J. Nelson, also a Yamhill county pioneer, were married October 1, 1879 in the Nelson home, at McMinnville. They were married by Rev. A. J. Hunsaker and uncle of the groom. For the first 14 years of their life they lived on a farm in Linn county and for the past 35 years they lived on a farm five miles south of Turner until last fall when they moved to Turner where Mr. Hunsaker purchased the G. A. G. Moore home on north Third street.

Bassett, adjutant of the Salem American Legion Post that vetrans ordepdendants of deceased vetrans must file applications for adjusted service certificates before January 1, 1930 or they will lose their rights in this respect.
