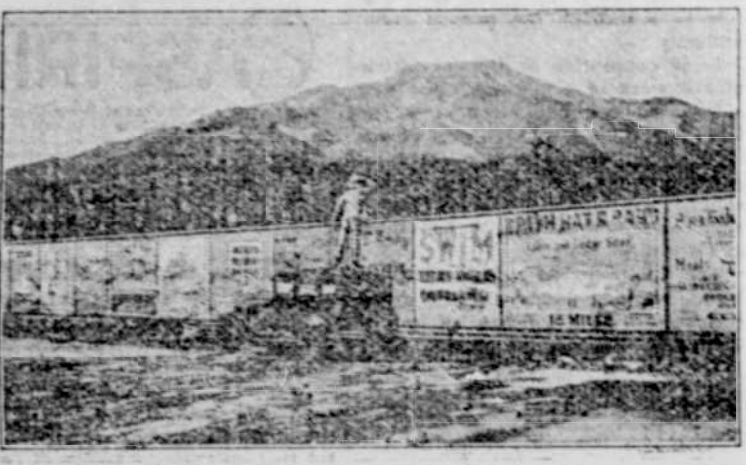

"SCENIC OR SIGN-IC?"



The photograph, according to the Standard Oil Bulletin, illustrates "a motorist viewing California Mountain Scenery." The Standard Oil Company of California is now conducting four prize contests with a view to finding a solution of the problem of the defacement of the scenery of the Pacific Coast by objectionable advertisements. Cash prizes of \$1,000, \$500 and \$250 are being offered for the three best 1500-word or less answers as to how the evil can be corrected; of \$300, \$250 and \$125 for the best 500 word or less statements as to why it should be corrected; of \$250, \$125 and \$75 for the three eight-word or less slogans which will most effectively arouse public sentiment on the question, and additional prizes of \$200, \$100, \$75, \$50 and \$25 for the five best amateur photographs of actual signs which best portray defacement.

Alexander, Seattle Garden Club; David Whitcomb, Chairman, Executive Committee, Pacific Empire Association.

A New Route By Sea

The name "Hudson Bay" was something to conjure with, in the early days of North American settlement. More recently, the once-magical name has fallen back to history and story. Now it again threatens to become potent—this time on account of the recently completed Hudson's Bay railway, running from Sault Ste. Marie, northwesterly to the little town of Churchill on the northeastern shore of the great bay.

Wheat from western Canada can now reach England, via Churchill, with only 3783 miles travel. The present route, via the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence, requires a 4878 mile journey.

The entire area of central and western Canada is brought several days nearer Europe by the new railroad. It was far seeing genius that achieved and had executed the Hudson's Bay railway. When producing areas are brought nearer, the market progress has been achieved—Portland Daily News.

Rev. Rees Passes

Word received here Saturday forenoon informs us that Rev. C. M. Rees, a former resident of Amity, passed away at the hospital at North Bend, Sept. 26, Rev. Rees had been in ill health for several years and gradually grew weaker, although his cheerful and faithful spirit never left him during all of his illness.

Rev. Chester Rees was born in Illinois July 30, 1843 and passed away at the hospital in North Bend September 26, 1929, at the age of 81 years, 1 month and 26 days.

He was united in marriage to Sylvia Ann Mawer March 6, 1870 and to this union were born five children all of whom survive him besides the widow. The children are Clarence B. Rees, Tacoma; Mrs. Bertha Weiman, Seaside, Oregon; Mrs. May Keizer, North Bend, Oregon; Mrs. Clarinda Palmer, New York City; and C. Roger Rees of Eugene, Oregon.

He was interested in the ministry of the Methodist church and served as pastor for 16 years, after which he served for years as a local preacher and field missionary. During his long period of illness in the Keizer Brothers Hospital in North Bend, it was his custom as long as his strength would permit to go from room to room spreading cheer with a kindly word or song to those who were suffering.—Amity Standard

Rev. Rees was well known to many in this section as he formerly lived here and served as pastor of the local Methodist church. His many friends will be saddened to learn of his passing.
