Again The Champœg Memorial

We received a pamphlet recently written by Milton A. Miller regarding the Champœg Memorial which has worthwhile ideas in it. We are glad to quote some of them.

"At the time of Champœg meeting in 1843 which led to the annexation of the Oregon country the Edinburgh Review said: 'If the Oregon country is ever settled it will be by some European country and by water as the Rocky Mountains are impassible.' This was also the contention in our own country. Many freely predicted that the Rocky Mountains was the natural boundary of the United States."

It was felt by the pioneers with the ox teams and rifles to find the passes through the mountains. At Fort Hall, 700 miles from the Willamette valley, they were urged to turn back as the mountains were impassible and the Indians were on the war path. But these pioneers pressed on with bravery and determination and finally reached the Willamette Valley and established settlements. After a time more came. While foreign countries were claiming this territory for themselves these pioneers with the ox whip and rifle pressed forward and without blood shed won this vast country for the United States.

Even though Mr. Miller believes it is fine thing for the government at Washington to have a part in building this memorial, we still stand for raising the money within the bounds of the original Oregon Territory and making it the home of the Oregon Historical museum. When built the President and members of the Cabinet at Washington should be invited to take part. It, then will belong to the original Oregon Territory.

Fighting The Jungle

The health of white men in the tropics has long been a serious problem of world wide importance. The classic example, invariably cited, is, of course, the Panama canal experience of the United States in the Philippines, southern Asia, East and West Indies, Africa and Central and South America where men from northern latitudes have always faced the danger of tropical illness no matter how short their stay. A definitely organized campaign to study and devise the means of escape from this danger has, therefore, been welcomed enthusiastically.

The Gorgas memorial laboratory, recent adjunct to Panama City, is taking the lead in the new work, with a study of malaris, probably the most universally dangerous of tropical diseases. Every possible bit of information obtainable is being sought for by the scientists at this institution and ways and means for prevention are to be thoughtfully considered. The United States has contributed \$50,000 to the cause. — Portland Daily News.
