We recoived a pamph'et recently written by Milton A. Miller 10 garding the Champoeg Memorial which has worthwhile ideas in it. We are glad to quote some of them.

"At the time of Champoog meeting in 1843 which led to the anrexation of the Oregon country the Edenburgh Review said: "If the Oregon country is ever settled it will be by some European country and by water as the Rocky Mountians are impassible,' This was also the contention in our own country. Many freely predicted that the Rocky Mountains was the natural Loundary of the United States."

It was left to the pioneers with the ex teams and rifles to flud the passes through the mountains. At Fort Hall, 700 miles from the Wilsmette valley, they were urged to thro back as the mountains were impassible and the Indians were on the war path. But these pioneers pores ed with bravery and determination pressed on and fina'y reachel the Willamette Valley and established settlements. After a time more came. While foreign countries were claiming this territo y for tu mselves these ploneers with the ox whip and rifle pressed forward and without blood shed won this vast country for the United States.

Even though Mr. Miller teleives it a fine thing for the government at Washington to have a part in building shis memorial, we still stand for raising the money within the bounds of the original Oregon Territory and making it the home of the Oregon Historical mu eum. When built the President and members of the Cabinent at Washingcon shoul be invited to take part. It, then will belong to the original
