Water Transportation

In the busy days of the years gone by water transportation was the main transportation of both passenger and freight. The river packers were the talk of the day. As time went on the railroads were built parallel to the rivers. Freight was moved more rapidly. Gradually the business was pulled away from the water carriers until the famous river packers were tied up and allowed to rot down and their machinery sold for junk. During the World War the need for water transportation came back and the government established water route and built barges propelled under their own power that operated on the Warrior river in Alabama and through the straits of the Gulf of Mexico to New Orleans. Later they were operated up the Mississippi to St. Louis. Then the traffic extended up the upper Mississippi. In 1921 four large steel barge floaters were built for the upper river trade. This became known as the upper Mississippi Warrior route. The next step was the Ohio river. The government has planned a system of dams and locks on the Ohio at a cost of several millions of dollars to open this great water way for freight transportation above the acknowledged head of navigation. This traffic pays. It has been done on the eastern streams. What can be done on our own streams. What possibilities could be opened up on the upper Columbia if the river was canalized by locks. The produce of the farm far inland could be brought to the sea ports for foreign shipment at much less than the present cost. This could not only be done for the Columbia but the Willamette as well. Many an old timer has seen the old river traffic built up and then die down and they will be able to see it come back again for it is coming. But it will not come unless the people want it and work for it. The government will do their part. Let us work for the day when our streams will throb with life as they have in days gone by.
