

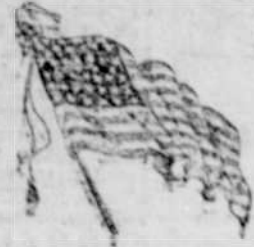

Secretary of State Fights Driving Hazards

Hazards of night driving will be considerably lessened during the coming winter months if Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss is successful in his plans to eliminate the "one-eyed" automobiles or cars with only one head light on Oregon highways.

"There is no excuse for so many cars operating with only one head light," says Mr. Hoss, "and I am determined to see conditions improved over what they have been. I expect soon to issue general instructions to the state traffic patrol to wage relentless war against the 'one-eyed' automobiles, and will ask all sheriffs, town marshals and other peace officers to cooperate. It reports indicate that it will be necessary to take violators into court, in addition to giving warnings, I will issue orders to that effect. Heretofore violators have gotten off with warnings, but I believe the offense serious enough to justify a fine. A combination of wet pavement, high speed, and a car with one headlight only results too often in an accident. Motorists are urged to lend their cooperation in this campaign by keeping both headlights in proper working order."
