There was a good exhibit of farm produce and needlework. Several prizes were given. Raymond Titus won the first prize on the best five ears of corn which was two one year subscriptions to The Tribune. There was no other five ear exhibit. Arthur Edwards won first on the best five potatoes which was also two one year subscriptions to The Tribune. W. F. Gulvin won second on potatoes which was a one year subscription to The Tribune. Arthur Edwards was the winner of the prize for the best display of farm products which was a two year subscription to The Tribune.

In the ladies division Mrs. Eleanor Titus won first on needle work which was a luncheon set donated by Harrison's General Store. ## ASLEEP IN JESUS

Gothlieb Baurer-Schiffener was born in Wirttemberg, Germany, May 13, 1856. There she grew to young womanhood and on September 9, 1879, was married to John Schiffener. Five years later they came to this country, locating in Illinois in 1884, where they lived for nearly ten years. In October, 1893, they came to Oregon, locating on a farm in the Summit Hill district near Turner, where they have since resided.

Mrs. Schiffener was the mother of nine children. Two sons died in infancy and a daughter, Louise, died in 1905, at the age of 21 years. Surviving her are the husband, John Schiffener; three sons, Fred, John, Jr., and William, all of Turner, and three daughters, Frieda of Turner, Mrs. Marie Stadelman of Portland and Emma of Salem. Nine grandchildren, one brother, Fred Baurer of Colton, Oregon, and many other relatives also survive her.

Mrs. Schiffener lived a simple, beautiful Christian life of love and patience. She was a true wife, a devoted mother and a kind neighbor. She ever had the welfare of her loved ones at heart and although she had many a hardship to bear, she was always patient and cheerful.

On account of ill health she was confined to her home much of the time, for many years. This kept her from taking active part in many activities she loved, but she ever thought of those who were unfortunate or in sorrow and her kind thoughts were out to all she knew.

She was brought up in the Lutheran faith but shortly after coming to Oregon she was baptized and united with the First German Baptist church of Salem of which church she was a member until her death. She had a great love for her church and the work of the church. Her patient, loving influence was an incentive to noble living, not only to her own family, but to all who knew her well.

On September 9th of this year, Mr. and Mrs. Schiffener celebrated their golden wedding anniversary with all of their children and grandchildren present.

On November 8, 1929, she peacefully passed away. She had reached the age of 73 years, 5 months and 25 days. Funeral services were held from her church in Salem, Monday, November 11, at 2 p. m., with Rev. G. W. Rutsch, pastor of the church in charge, assisted by Rev. Wm. Graf of Bethany. She was buried in the Odd Fellows cemetery near her home.
