GOVERNOR PATTERSON ISSUES THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

The turn of the year brings us again to the season when man, impelled by an age-old and world-wide impulse, has been wont to offer his human thanks to Almighty God for the fulfillment of His ancient promise that while the earth remaineth seed time and harvest shall not fail.

Our national observance of an annual day of thanksgiving was instituted when our Pilgrim forefathers gathered together to make grateful acknowledgement for the bountiful crops on which depended their survival. Since that first American harvest, progress along innumerable lines has added to the comfort, the efficiency and the security of our lives. Wealth and high position have been vouchsafed us as a nation. Manifest and great opportunities have been opened up to us as individuals. Social and economic changes have been vast, but the spiritual truth remains steadfast that material achievements are made fruitful only by guidance and strength from a power which is above and beyond human endeavors. Eternal and universal in the hearts of thoughtful men is the prayer, "Establish Thou the work of our hands."

Now, therefore, I, I. L. Patterson, Governor of the State of Oregon, in conformity to the proclamation of the President of the United States, do proclaim Thursday, November 28, 1929, as Thanksgiving Day, and do hereby set it aside as a public holiday.

Let us, on this day, give thought to man's fellowship with nature in the husbandry of the fruitful earth, first source of all wealth. Let us acknowledge the ties of family affection and renew the bond of heart and home. Let us confirm and strengthen the will to peace, stronger now than ever before in the hearts of men. Let us share our abundance with the less fortunate, and let us humbly dedicate our power and prosperity to the service of Almighty God.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state of Oregon to be hereunto affixed this 15th day of November, A. D. 1929.

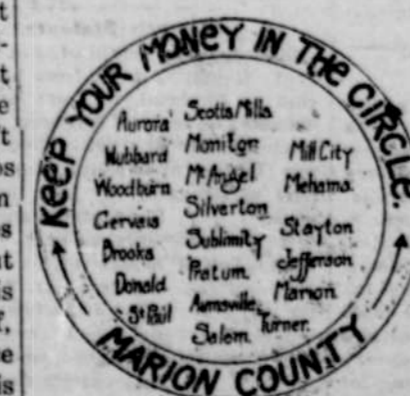
Mrs. Nelly Hamilton and Mrs. Jay Cook were in Salem last Thursday on business.

THE PENALTY OF SUCCESS

"If a man can build a better mousetrap than his neighbor," said Emerson, "the world will make a beaten path to his door."

The Sage of Concord doubtless realized that jealous neighbors with inferior mousetraps might try to deflect the crowd from the beaten path. He possibly perceived that failing in this with mousetraps, they would resort to claptrap.

But he knew that the better mousetrap rather than the noiser claptrap would continue to keep the world on the path to the door of the man who wrought the superior article.

Leadership has its penalties. Superiority inspires envy. Envy expresses itself through detraction.

Just as imitation by a competitor is the sincerest form of flattery, so a competitor's destructive, backbiting criticism is one of the surest confessions of conscious inferiority.

The superior piece of woodworking machinery can stand on its own merits. It speaks eloquently enough for itself without crying down any other.

The position of a strong, pace-setting organization does not need to be bolstered by the petty iteration of invidious comparison. It is only the weaker, less secure organization, conscious of its less sure footing, that will resort to either credibly blunt or subtly mischievous detraction of a successful rival.

Leaders do not fear nor shun the acid test of comparison. But they do not have to establish recognition of superiority by traducing their lagging competitors.

Positive merit usually can establish a shining enough place for itself by positive performance. When sales representatives resort to chronic, systematic knocking of competitors, you can generally size them and their organization up as sufferers from an ingrowing inferiority complex.

In this form the penalty of leadership never seriously penalizes true merit, so long as "seeing is believing" in fair competitive tests and the world, while it loves the zest of keen rivalry, believes staunchly in the essentials of fair play.
