THE AMERICAN HOME

This is the first of a series of articles on the American Home by Job L. Manfred as announced last week.

This being the first of a series of articles dealing with what the writer believes to be the most momentous question before the American people today, must necessarily be introductory, and rather general in character, leaving the specific discussion for those to follow. It is my earnest wish that these articles may prove to be not only informative and convincing but productive of some good. With that end in view, what is said will have to be based, not on hearsay evidence, but on facts. Rev. Dan Poling, former Oregonian and now the head of the largest organization of youth in the world, The International Society of Christian Endeavor, recently said: "The most successful leaders of reform have always been those who did not speak until they had adequate information upon which to base their statements." That is precisely the line along which the writer of these articles intends to travel.

Not all of us are convinced that there is anything seriously wrong with the present-day American home. There are those who claim that American home life is not only deteriorating; but that it is perilously close to the disintegration point. Others there are who stoutly maintain that there is nothing amiss at all. Still others profess to see in the signs of the times merely a transition from the hectic conditions caused by the world war, to a normal, sane state in which the vast majority of American families will be found in full possession of all the old time vigor and virtue that have made our country great.

There is a fourth group, quite numerous and emphatic, who smile in a depreciatory way when the American home is mentioned. "Why, there ain't no such animal," they say, "it's gone, gone, gone, along with the diplodocus and the ichthyosaurus." Said one of them to me a while ago, "Used to be when we heard the strains of 'Home Sweet Home,' we would have visions of 'happy family' gatherings. We would sniff an imaginary whiff of one of mother's home cooked dinners, the like of which was nowhere else to be found. Now, when we hear that grand old tune we think of 'Home-brew,' and get an altogether different kind of smell." And it goes. There are many, diverse opinions regarding the present status of the American home. The outstanding fact, however, is that we hear with increasing and disturbing frequency such questions as: "What's the with the American home?" "What's wrong with American home life?" Hence we begin to sense the existence of a real problem. Practically all of our leading newspapers and magazines have been directing attention to the subject in the form of articles under various heads such as: "Why the home is failing," "Criminality in the home," "Restoring American home life," etc., etc.

President Hoover, in one of his inspirational radio addresses, seemed to feel the need of uttering some timely comments on this phase of our national life. Among other things he told us that "the true conception of America is not a country of 110 million people but a nation of 23 million homes." Amplifying this, he said "I wish to remind you of something which may sound humble and common-

place, but it vibrates through every hope of the future. It is this--the UNIT OF AMERICAN LIFE IS THE FAMILY AND THE HOME. It is the economic unit as well as the moral and spiritual unit. But it is more than this. It is the beginning of self government. It is the throne of our highest ideals. It is the source of the spiritual energy of our people. For the perfecting of this unit of national life we must bend all of our material and scientific ingenuity. For the attainment of this end we must lend every energy of the government."

Touching on the government's responsibility to the homes of the nation, he had this to say: "I read into these intricate and delicate relations of the government with business and with our political and social life, but one upmost end--that we reinforce the ties that bind together the millions of our families, that we strengthen the SECURITY, THE HAPPINESS AND THE INDEPENDENCE OF EVERY HOME."

Now, where there is so much smoke there must be some fire. Where there has been, and is, so much discussion there must be something to discuss. We can no longer blink at the fact that there is something wrong, somewhere. What that something is, is our moral duty to discover and then endeavor to remedy it.

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449 ACRE RANCH SOLD TO EDWARD L. MARTIN

Sale of 449 acres of land by the Ralph Bernard Estate to Edward L. Martin and wife, of Tammany, for \$21,000 was confirmed in the probate court yesterday. The sale involves the tract of land located on the road connecting the upper Tammany section with Sweetwater creek the house being at the summit where the Lewiston Orchard viaduct crosses the highway.

The Bernard land is of deep, rich soil and 410 acres of the 449 are under cultivation. The acquisition of the Bernard ranch gives Mr. Martin title to 1,990 acres located in the Tammany section and of this amount nearly 1,900 acres are under the plow. The Martin home ranch is located in lower Tammany and in addition to his own holdings, Mr. Martin operates leased land which brings his farm area to about 1,500 acres.
