On January 16, 1930, prohibition will have been in the Constitution of the United States through the going into effect of the eighteenth amendment, exactly ten years ago. During the past ten years the amendment has had ten years of varied experiences. There has been a continuous fight to maintain it. There have been some good results from the eighteenth amendment even though there has been partiality in enforcement. There has been a tendency on the part of the officers to ride the small fry and let the big ones get by with their cellars well stocked.

The main benefit noted was the ability of the working man to purchase clothes and provisions for his family immediately following the adoption of national

prohibition. The banks reported greater savings deposits principally among the working class. Even though there are numerous faults found in the enforcement of the bill, the improve conditions noted above more than balance the faults.

This tenth anniversary will be observed in the schools, churches and other organizations generally over the country.

## Tuberculosis Seal Sale Closes

Incomplete returns from the sale of Tuberculosis Christmas seals held through the turner high school came to a successful close with a total sale of \$25.00 worth of seals sold. Miss Josephine Gilstrap had charge of the sale in the high school. The intermediate grades reported the largest sale. The sale in the grades was in charge of Mrs. Neal Edwards Marjorie McKay received the prize for the largest sale, turning in \$1.35.

Cloverdale school, Mrs. Henry Barnett, Teacher, reported sales amounting to \$5.10 and \$1.70 was reported from the Crawford school. \$1.41 raised on the outside brought the total to \$25.00 with the Pleasant Point district yet to be heard from.

The seal sale is an annual event held every year from Thanksgiving to Christmas. 5% of the returns go to the national association, 35% to the state and 60% remains in the county for local work.  
Mrs. J. S. McKinney, chairman last year, did some good work with the schools cooperating. This year she turned the work over to the school, which organization did some good work under the leadership of Mrs. John Cox, as chairman.
