SO phenomenal has been the increase of trust business that statisticians are unable to keep a true record of its advancement.

There are now something like 3,500 active trust departments in banks in America, while in 1909 only 165 active trust departments had been established.

In becoming the custodians of the guardians of the property of others, bankers as John G. Lonsdale sums what has been fittingly described as one of the "most exacted human relationships ever created by law." They become at once a big brother, a big sister, an advisor, or a confessor, sworn so to conduct themselves that clients will be won to them by their ability and integrity.

Thousands of little children have received an education and have been started off right in life through the trust department's safe keeping and guidance of the family estate, numberless widows have been protected from merciless stock swindlers, many thousands of business men have been relieved of troublesome details in the conduct of their business through the creation of a living trust and still others have safeguarded their business enterprises through life insurance trusts.

The favorable reaction of the public toward trust department services is not accidental. It may be traced jointly to the growing intelligence of the American people in financial affairs and to advertising to the world at large the merits of trust services. Advertising used in a sensible, judicious way is necessary, a power that has accomplished much good for humanity.

**CAN OF PEAS BRINGS FARM WOMAN FAME AND FORTUNE**

Mrs. Mary Hvass, of Kennan, Wis., Wins \$1,250 in National Canning Contest—Gives Pressure Cooking Credit.

America's champion canner is a farmer's wife, once cook in a lumberjack lunchroom. She is Mrs. Mary Hvass of Kennan, Wis., who won this title and a grand prize of \$1,250 in the National Canning contest, conducted by the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, just ended in Chicago.

ago, for the best jar of home-cooked food submitted in the nation-wide contest in which 25,000 women participated. Her contribution, which eminent domestic science judges selected as the premier jar, was a can of peas. Mrs. Hvass is a pioneer who has been winning prizes ever since she and her husband, John Hvass, set out to win a livelihood from their Wisconsin land. Prizes at the county and state fairs for chickens, bread and cakes, and canned goods.

She first saw the Wisconsin prairie as a three-year-old Mary Jensen. It was her job, as she grew up, to help her father and mother win bread and butter for nine small Jensens and themselves. She was her mother's helper on the farm until all the children were well on their way to growing up. Then she yielded to the glamour of the trading town called Minneapolis.

At Minneapolis she became a cook at a lumberjack lunchroom, where she met and married lumberjack John Hvass. They moved to Wisconsin, first to a small farm, later to a larger one, where they are living today. There Mary Hvass helped her husband fell trees, build barns, fences, and their house. For nearly thirty-three years they struggled together.

When Mrs. Mary Hvass heard that one jar of peas that she had canned was worth \$1,250, it seemed incredible to her. It was just one jar out of hundreds that were canned all as part

of a summer's work. And it was simple business to put them up. She followed directions in a government bulletin.

"I used a pressure cooker, as the government advised, because I've tried every other way and I know it's best," she explained.

"First, I blanched the peas for 30 minutes in scalding water. Then I dipped them in cold water, poured them in a mason jar with seasoning, and put the jar in my pressure cooker for 50 minutes at 240 degrees.

"That's all the work it took to make them ready for the contest. I wouldn't want anything more certain and simple than my Kook-Kwick pressure cooker for canning peas and all kinds of food."

Judges of the contest who declared the peas canned by Mrs. Hvass to be perfect in flavor, color and general appearance were Dr. Margaret Just, president of the American Home Economics association; Dr. Louisa Stanley, director of the United States Bureau of Home Economics; Mrs. Josephine Bakke, home economics director at Iowa State Agricultural college; Miss Elaine Massey, director of girls' club work in Mississippi, and George Farrell, director of extension in the Middle West for the Department of Agriculture.

There are canned peas and canned peas that win prizes, but those that were canned by Mrs. Mary Hvass go even further. They are going to pay

for their own creaming and buttering. The grand prize check of \$1,250 is going to set up Mrs. Hvass in the dairy business.

Her ambition for many years was to own a herd of pure-bred Holstein cattle and to extend her prize winning into wider fields. Now her ambition will be realized with the purchase of the nucleus of such a dairy herd.

Johnny Muskrat, broadcaster on fur trapping and fur marketing for the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, is a mighty busy man these days. Not only does he give fur talks

from station WLS, Chicago, as he has for several years, but also makes hurry-up trips to Minneapolis to talk to trappers over station WCCO. In addition Johnny is writing fur market letters for stations KJR Seattle; KMBG Kansas City; WCAU Philadelphia; KOA Denver, and WFAA Dallas, which will be broadcast regularly during the fur season.

Johnny Muskrat draws on a lifetime of actual experience in instructing trappers how to catch furs, how to correctly prepare them for sale, and when to ship them. The Foundation has found these talks to be useful not only for informing trappers on fur market conditions from day to day but also in helping them take more and better furs.

In addition to telling of his own experiences, Johnny frequently broadcasts the interesting letters he receives from his trapper friends. Occasionally, one of his old friends drops into the studio and is introduced to the radio audience. Among the interesting characters to be introduced by Johnny at various times during the present season will be El Gomancho, noted writer and authority on outdoor and pioneer life. El Gomancho is also scheduled to officiate as one of the Fur Show judges when the prize winning pelts are to be selected.

In spite of all his radio duties Johnny finds time to keep track of entries for the First National Fur Show and reports that judging by those pelts already received the show should be a truly wonderful exhibition of the trapper's skill in skinning, stretching, and drying pelts.
