A Step in the Right Direction

A report of the Oregon Judicial Council, signed by Justices Belt and Coshov, of the state supreme court, and Circuit Judges Alger Fee of Pendleton, Robert Tucker of Portland and James Brand of Marshfield, filed with Governor Norblad, Saturday, contains a number of recommendations which it is felt by the council would expedite and improve existing court procedure.

Probably the most important of these recommendations is the one providing that a person convicted of crime on a plea of insanity shall be sentenced to serve at least three years in an insane asylum without right of habeas corpus.

Any number of cases might be cited showing flagrant abuse of the insanity defense, where the defendant has been adjudged insane and after a brief confinement in a hospital has been released. It is this sort of thing that is responsible for much of the current criticism that our criminal laws are inefficient and unfairly administered.

The council is to be congratulated for its stand on this question and immediate steps toward the adoption of its recommendation should be taken.

convention just completed at Marshfield and Coquille, urged gradual expansion only by means of increasing efficiency of herds. Such efficiency, it was declared, should come through better feeds, elimination of cows under the 300-pound butterfat limit, better sires, and raising of heifer calves only from 300-pound cows and high record sires. The present surplus of dairy products, it was held, is due to decreased consumption coupled with over expansion in some milk producing sections, particularly the milk sheds of large cities. To aid in correction of under consumption in this state, the association laid comprehensive plans for a unified campaign of education designed to stimulate use of more dairy products of all kinds, rather than limiting the drive to merely butter, milk or both. Particular emphasis is to be given to encouraging dairy manufacturers and retail dealers to give more attention to dairy products in paid display advertising in newspapers. A positive campaign in favor of dairy products rather than a negative drive against substitutes was the plan of action decided upon. The association also urged a "shakeup" in the present administration of the tuberculosis and abortion eradication work. A committee was named to confer with the livestock sanitary board in an effort to correct alleged serious conditions. New officers of the association chosen are: President, Sidney Miller, Woodburn; first vice-president, Marvin Thomas, Redmond; second vice-president, Thomas Acree, Hood River; secretary, P. M. Brandt, Oregon State college; assistant secretary, N. C. Jamison, Corvallis. The next convention will be held in Redmond.
