The board of directors of the Turner Telephone company met Friday evening with all members present. Bills for new galvanized wire and other supplies recently purchased were ordered paid, as were bills for labor on line repairs.

Peetz was present and outlined a plan whereby he would agree to keep the lines in repair, building lines up to two miles in length without added expense, operate the switchboard and supply batteries for the switchboard for a stipulated sum. FIVE CONCRETE BRIDGES WILL BE CONSTRUCTED

Five new concrete bridges will be constructed on the Turner-Aumsville road this summer, according to an announcement issued by County Engi-

neer Hedda Swart. The new bridges, which will be 24 feet in width, will eliminate the present hazardous narrow ones along this road. They are to be constructed entirely of concrete and will have a pleasing and appropriate design.

In addition to the five bridges one concrete box culvert is to be constructed on the Marion-Turner road. A single contract for the erection of the five bridges and the culvert will be let if present plans are carried out.

A current rumor which happens to have issued from good authority is to the effect that the stretch of road between Turner and Jefferson is scheduled for paving this summer.
