POWER AND THE PEOPLE

Next Tuesday the question of public control of the power sites in the state of Oregon will be settled for another two years. This question has caused more discussion, pro and con, than any other issue before the people to be decided at the coming election. The public utilities are spending thousands of dollars trying to defeat the Grange Power bill which is being solidly backed by Julius L. Meier, independent candidate for governor. They are trying to make it appear that they are sponsoring the people's interests in the present campaign. In reality they are making a desperate effort to save their own bacon and still continue to realize enormous profits from their over-capitalized properties.

Kenneth G. Harlan, nationally known power expert says in a radio address on the Grange Power bill: "The Grange constitutional amendment is safeguarded in every respect by other provisions of our constitution, and the desperate fight that the power trust is now waging against it is not in the interest of the public but wholly for fear that such a law will interfere with the monopoly and with the handsome profits that have rolled into Wall Street."

The power companies are fighting to gain control of the millions of dollars worth of power sites that remain yet undeveloped. There is no guarantee that they will not do as they done in the past, when they get control, inflate the capitalization and assess rates accordingly. There is only one thing to do and that is for the public to control the power sites that belong to the public.

How long are the thinking American people going to continue to yet the power trust dictate their ballot? Let us quote former Governor Pinchot, of Pennsylvania: "We have seen the electric monopoly pick out state governments. We have seen it crack its whip over state assemblies. We have seen it with stupid arrogance and conscienceless boldness corrupt elections and attempt to buy a seat in the United States senate. We have seen it attempt to compel the United States senate to deliver that purchased seat."

Mr. Pinchot further compares the electric monopoly to a super-state over aweing and dominating the state which he says is intolerable.

Do the people of Oregon care enough for their natural resources to protect them from this condition? When the votes are counted on November 4th the question will be answered.—(Contributed Editorial.)
