"Seven residents of Oregon were awarded Insuil medals for meritorious cases of resuscitation by the prone pressure method, according to a report just made public by the National Electric Light association. The lives of 329 persons who would have died from electric shock were saved in the years between 1922 and 1930 by employes of electric light and power companies applying the prone pressure method of resusciation, the report stated.
