Station is closed on Sunday and holidays. On these days passengers can pay fare and have baggage checked on trains.

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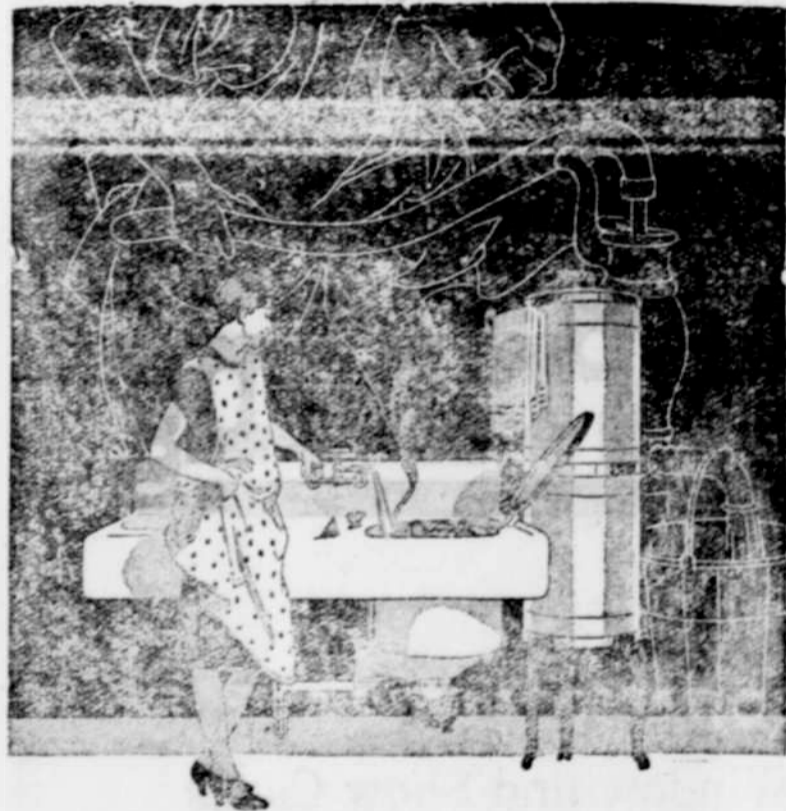
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
