School Meeting Lively Ask For Resignation New Clerk, Director

Unusual interest was manifest in Monday's school election when one director and a clerk were elected and the budget of \$150 carried for free text books.

Ulwin Denyer, outgoing director, and W. T. Riches, clerk, presided throughout the meeting; Clifford White and Standley Riches acted as tellers.

A complete financial report was not given at this time.

J. E. Whitehead, Jr., carried the most votes, 66 for director to 31 for Mr. Denyer.

Ninety seven votes were cast for clerk; Mrs. Mable Martin receiving 65 and W. T. Riches 32.

Frank Delzell made a motion asking for the resignation of the remaining two directors C. A. Bear and A. Edwards. The chair deemed the motion out of order and asked for a motion for adjournment which lost when put to a vote.

Mr. Bear then informed all that he and Mr. Edwards would not resign under any condition. Another motion for adjournment was made and lost also and after a third motion lost a vote was taken resulting when polled in 43 votes favoring the resignation of Mr. Bear and Mr. Edwards and 36 that they remain.

Many patrons of the school feel that the school board have not handled school affairs in a business-like manner and a decided change is needed.
