EVERETT BANK IS
HELD UP BY THUG
GRABS FEW HUNDRED DOLLARS
AND ESCAPES.
INGNORES BANK'S PATRONS
In Exchange of Shot, Cashier
Wounded in the Neck—Thug
Thought to Be Injured.
Everett, Wash., July 7.—A lone
robber held up Assistant Cashier E.
C. Olson, of the Bank of Commerce,
shortly before the bank closed
Tuesday afternoon, wounded Cashier
J. L. Lyon and escaped with a few
hundred dollars.
When the robber entered the bank
he thrust two revolvers into Olson's
face and commanding him to throw
up his hands, laid down one gun and
seized all the money he could reach
and placed it in his satchel. He paid
no attention to the customers in the
bank.
Cashier Lyon was in the rear end
of the building. He ran down an
alleyway and entered by the front
door to take the robber by surprise
and grappled with him. The robber
shot three times, one bullet passing
through Lyon's jaw and neck, making
a serious wound.
The robber then fled with both
Lyon and Olson shooting at him.
His hat was shot off and it is be-
lieved he was slightly wounded. He
is described as young and smooth-
shaven, medium height. He was un-
dressed and wore a long light coat.

FRIENDS ASSIST SCHIVELY

Pressure Brought to Bear to Drop
Spokane Charges.

Spokane, July 6.—Pressure is be-
ing brought to bear on Prosecuting
Attorney Fugh, of Spokane county,
to secure dismissal of indictments
returned by the grand jury here,
charging Insurance Commissioner
Schively with embezzlement and
perjury in connection with the Pa-
cific Livestock Company. The ob-
ject of the dismissal is to open the
way for Schively to resign his state
office and to choke off any further
proceedings against him.
Schively's friends are urging the
dismissal of the Spokane indictments
and retirement of Schively as the
best way out of the trouble. The
indictment counts are incorporated
in the charges to be brought before
the senate. Advocates of this course
hold that in view of the heavy cost
the impeachment proceedings must
entail, Spokane county authorities
could find it expedient to drop fur-
ther prosecution.

THE AUDITORIUM.

The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition at Seattle, occupying 250 acres
of the campus of the University of Washington, will result in benefits for
Washington's seat of learning that the University could not have hoped
to secure in many years, had not the great fair of 1909 been planned. So
the exposition that will exploit Alaska, Hawaii and the Philippines and
emphasize the importance of the growing trade with the Orient will leave,
after its gates have closed, a large number of permanent structures to
constantly remind the people of the Northwest of the Alaska-Yukon-
Pacific Exposition and the place it will occupy in the history of the Pacific
as the medium through which one-half of the world was brought in such
close touch with the other and a tremendous impetus to commercial in-
tercourse given.

Seven buildings on the exposition grounds will be left for use of the
University and the auditorium, one of the finest of this group, cost the
State of Washington more than \$100,000. While the exposition is in
progress this building will be used for conventions, congresses and con-
ferences, and its hundreds of seats were in place and the building turned
over to the exposition management three months before the opening date
of the fair.

Yukon Avenue is one of the many ways leading to the Court of Honor
of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition. It leads from the Cascades
down to one of the many entrances to the Pay Streak and directly to the
"caf  center" of the Fair Grounds.

On the left of the picture a facade of the European Exhibits Building
shows. On the right is a corner of the Palace of Agriculture. In the
distance, and across the Cascades, is to be seen the Oriental Building.
All of these structures were completed before December 1, 1908.
They are of the conventional exposition type of construction—plaster
staff over heavy wooden framework.
