Oregon Days at A .- Y .- P. Exposition. Portland-Hundreds of Oregonlans will participate in the exercises incident to Oregon day at the A.-Y.-P. Fair Friday, July 9. An all-day's programme has been arranged. Including literary exercises in the forenoon, a reception in the afternoon and a promenade and dance in the evening.

During the day the commission will distribute at the Oregon building 10,000 souvenirs that have been provided for the occasion. Ellis Would Help Carey Act.
