The constitutional amendment pro-
viding for women's suffrage was killed
by the Missouri senate.

The Nebraska house defeated the
proposed constitutional amendment
permitting women to vote.

The British naval estimates for 1913-
1914 total \$331,546,500 as compared
with \$225,377,000 last year.

The Missouri supreme court affirm-
ed the constitutionality of the law pro-
hibiting lotteries, policy games or bet-
ting.

A bill has been introduced in the
New York legislature to prohibit the
employment of children in the can-
neries of the state.

Japanese graduates of Harvard have

subscribed to a fund of \$20,000 to be
used by the corporation as a founda-
tion upon which to establish lecture-
ships on oriental philosophy.

Giving the officials of the company
no warning, nearly 500 linemen and
electrical workers employed by the
British Columbia Telephone company
throughout British Columbia went on
strike.
