MURDER SUSPECT CAUGHT

Nephew of Idaho Farmer is Held for Shooting

Lewiston.—Jas. Deering, a nephew of George Deering, who was shot and killed near his home near Grandeville has been arrested by the authorities of Idaho county, and is held as a suspect in the shooting. Young Deering stoutly protested arrest and disclaims any connection with the shooting.

Investigation of the conditions about the Deering ranch revealed that some relationship difficulties have arisen in the past few weeks. James Deering, who is an orphan, has been reeling with his uncle since the death of his father. Difficulties, it appears, had arisen and James Deering was expelled from the George Deering home. Subsequent to this the young man took up a homestead about a half a mile from the Deering ranch.

Suit Against Iron Works
Wallace.—The financial troubles of the Lead-Silver Mining company were revived here when the Rex Mining company brought suit against the Coeur d'Alene Iron Works in the district court to recover the value of 10 ore cars of the value of \$768 and damages of \$500.

G. A. R. Veterans Rap Governor
Boise.—The Grand Army of the Republic of the state of Idaho at its final day's encampment at Nampa administered a rebuke and censured Governor John M. Haines for his delivery of an address before the members of the G. A. R. in which reference was made to the political situation in this country and the short ballot was strongly endorsed. The governor was criticized for some of his official acts, the encampment going on record as against them.

Pelkey Goes Free on Jury's Verdict
