On and after July 1, 1913, ordinary postage stamps, including commemorative issues, shall be valid for postage and for insurance and collect—on—delivery fees on fourth-class mail, and distinctive parcel post shall be valid for all purposes for which ordinary stamps are valid. The regular issue of due stamps and distinctive parcel post due stamps shall be valid for the collection of unpaid and short-paid postage on all classes of mail.

A mailable parcel on which the postage is fully prepaid may be insured against loss in an amount equivalent to its actual value, but not to exceed \$25, on payment of a fee of five cents, and in an amount equivalent to its actual value in excess of \$25, but not to exceed \$50, on payment of a fee of ten cents in stamps, to be affixed. The amount of the insurance fee shall be placed on the receipt given the sender and on the coupon retained at the mailing office.

FRAUD IN REFERENDUM?

Will Investigate Petition to Refer Oregon Compensation Law.

Salem, Or.—In the belief that they have evidence that discredits many of the signatures to the petitions to refer the workmen's compensation act, Harvey Beckwith and C. D. Babcock, prospective members of the workmen's compensation commissioners under the law, will ask an investigation by the district attorney of Multnomah county.

After several weeks of work, Messrs. Beckwith and Babcock finished in examination of the petitions and all evidence obtained will be turned over to the district attorney.

While unwilling for the present to give specific instances of irregularities they say they have found sufficient duplications of signatures and false addresses to justify them in asking for an investigation by the courts.
