# **WESTERN PACIFIC WILL BUILD** FEEDERS FOR THEIR LINE

The announcement of the new manager of the Western Pacific that his road would build feeders for his ilne. including one to this section, indi cates that we will soon have a much more direct connection with San Francisco, which will be of great benefit to both sections.

The road from Winnemucca to some point in the Snake river valley will be a good money maker and serve a large section of virgin territory and it is almost certain that one of the big systems will get behind it.

Another short cut can be made by a road south through the Twin Falls section to Cobre and there connect with the road to Ely, the great copper camp, also Pioche and on to Les Angeles over the Clark road, saving nearly 200 miles over the route by Pocatello and Salt Lake.

The route by Winnemucca will save over 500 miles of the present haul to San Francisco.

The management of the Idaho Northern announced that they will rush the work on their line from Smith's Ferry to the Payette lakes and be through in time for traffic this fall, which wil be a great boon to the people of the Long Valley and Payette lake section.
