**OLD WELL YIELDS BONES**  
Excavation for New Building Leads to Discovery of Human Skeletons  
Welsler.—Gossip among the pioneers of this section has been revived by the discovery of a number of skeletons on the Neeley ranch, east of the city, while a basement was being dug, but as yet there seems to be no solution of the mystery.  
The first discovery was made when a number of small bones, thought to be human, were unearthed at a depth of several feet. Later the skull was exposed. This was followed by the discovery of other skeletons. The positions indicated beyond doubt that the bodies had been buried head downward. Closer investigation also revealed that they had been buried in a well.  
Soon after the discovery Mr. Neeley notified Coroner McCann, who went to the scene at once and brought the skeletons to town. A careful investigation indicated that some of the bones were of women. Opinions differ as to whether they are of Indians or white people, but they are generally believed to be of Indians.  
Appeal Is Taken.  
Boise.—The American Surety Company of New York has appealed from the judgment of the District Court for Blaine county in the case of the state of Idaho to and for the use and benefit of Clara Mills et al. vs. the American Surety Company. In the trial court the surety company was held liable to the depositors of the defunct Idaho State Bank of Hally for the failure of William G. Cruise, ex-estate bank examiner, faithfully to perform his duties.  
Explosion Wrecks Thresher.  
Kendrick.—Following an explosion caused by smut the separator belonging to J. W. Pirell, a thresherman and extensive farmer on Big Potlatch ridge, was completely destroyed by fire. The strawstack was destroyed, but the grain was saved.
