B. Whealdon and family were entertained Sunday at Supt. G. W. Cotton's home.

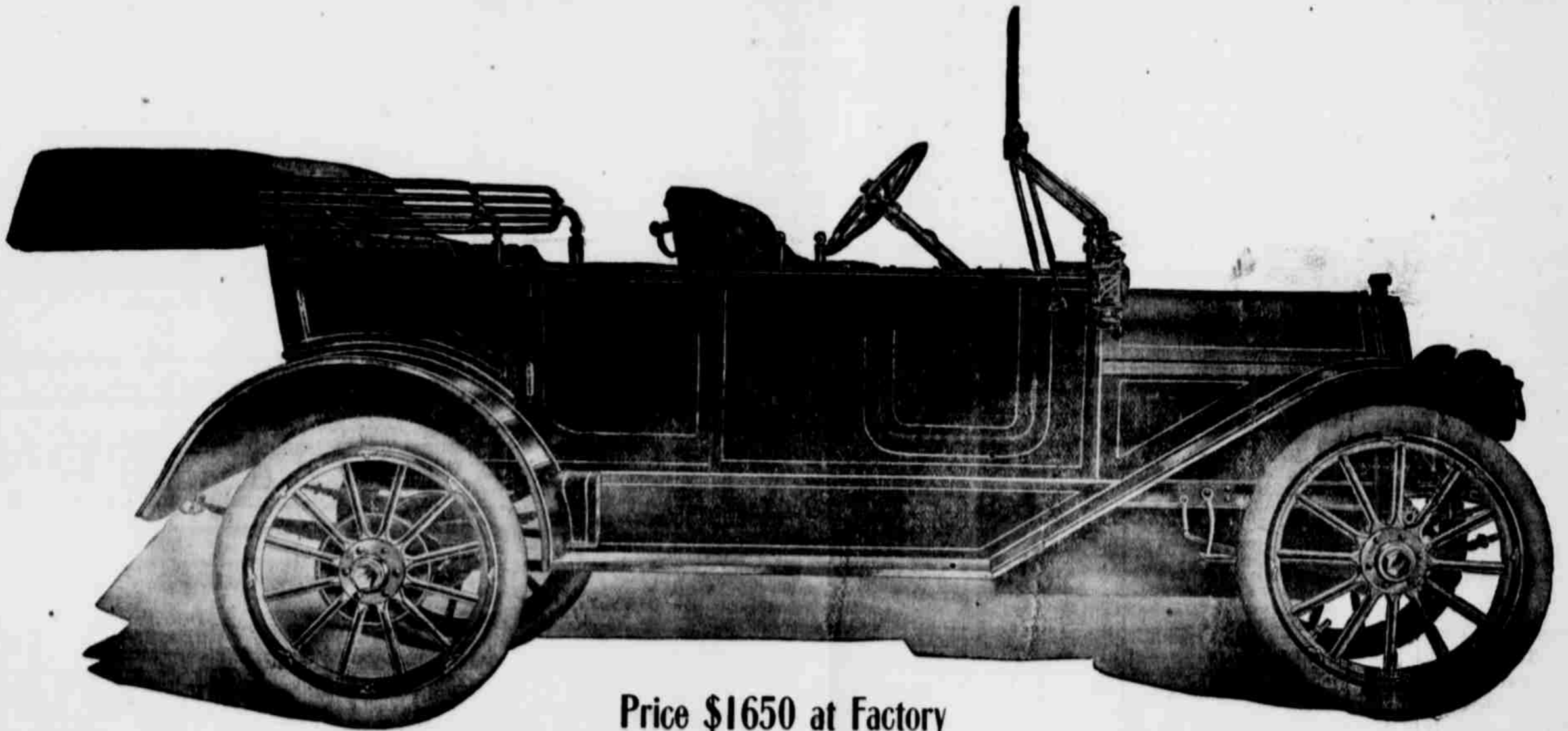

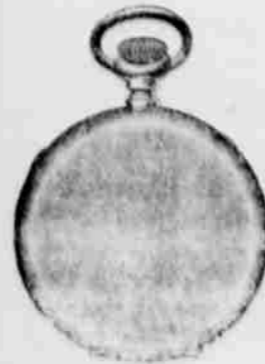
