Important Occurrences Of The Past Week From Cities In Our State

Asks \$30,000 For Husband's Death. Sandpoint.-The widow of Henry Nauck, a millwright in the employ of the Dover Lumber company, who was killed April 2 of this year by a breaking belt, has filed a suit against the company for \$30,000 damages.

Nauck was at work on an idler when the large main dive belt of the mill broke and a loose end struck him in the chest, killing him instantly. The complaint alleges that the belt was defective, that it had broken and had been improperly repaired on the night preceding the accident and that the company was ngeligent in not notifying Nauck of this.

YOUTH AND GIRL KILLED

Train Hits Buggy With Eight Returning From Dance.

-Two are dead, two probably fatally injured and four others hurt in the running down of a buggy containing eight young people who were returning from a dance by the North Park special on the Oregon Short Line due at Ashton, Idaho, at 3:30 A. M. Four members of the party were carried on the pilot of the engine to the Ashton station before the accident was discovered. When the train stopped there two young men and two young women were seen clinging to the pilot. One of them, Miss Clara Martindale, died as she was taken from the engine.

The train was backed several miles to the scene of the collision and the others injured were picked up and taken to Ashton. At 5:30 o'clock a special left with the four most seriously injured, Clifford Harris, Lee Drollinger, Claude Dayley and Abbie Garrett, for Salt Lake.

Drollinger died before Pocatello was reached. Harris and Miss Garrett are expected to die.

Water and Light Rates Up. Coeur d'Alene.-At a special meeting of the city council to consider the matter of municipal ownership of water and lights it was voted to at once apply to the state public utility Kootenal Power company, the matter to be placed before the board in person by Mayor R. S. Nelson. The councfl will also ascertain at what figures these plants can be purchased or new ones built and the estimated cost of maintenance after city ownership has been gained.

Action on Power Project Desired.

Salem.—Declaring that delay may V. W. eopardize the investigation, State Engineer Lewis wrote to the members, so far appointed, of the committee to investigate "The Five-Mile Ra pids," or "The Dalles Power Project," to meet in the parlors of the Portland commercial club

At the last session of the legislature a bill was passed appropriating \$15,-000 for an investigation of the proposed work, the cost of transmission of power and other features. The committee is instructed to make its report to the next legislature. The plan embraces co-operation of the Mrs. state of Washington, which is to share F. W the power to be obtained.

West Commutes Morgan's Penalty. Salem.-Governor West commuted the sentence of Robert Morgan, 18 years of age, sentenced to be hanged for killing Virgie Hart, his sweetheart, in Condon in October, 1912, to life imprisonment.

"The youth of the boy and the many petitions and pleas that his life be spared were my reasons for commuting his sentence," said the government
