SYNOPSIS OF NEW FEDERAL GAME LAWS NOW IN FORCE

Following is a synopsis of the federal law relative to game birds in Oregon. This law takes precedent over all state laws relative to these birds:

A daily closed season on all migratory game and insectivorous birds between sunset and sunrise.

A five year closed season beginning October 1, 1913, on the following game birds: Band tailed pigeons, little brown, sandhill and whoping cranes, swans, curlews, wood ducks and all shore birds except black breasted and golden plover, Wilson or jack snipe, woodcock and greater and lesser yellowlegs.

Open season on ducks, geese, mallards, coot, gallinules, from October 1 to January 15, dates inclusive.

Open season on black breasted and golden plover, Wilson or jack snipe and greater and lesser yellowlegs from October 1 to December 15, dates inclusive.

All migratory insectivorous birds protected indefinitely.

Oregon State Tax Higher.

Salem, Or.—Because of the inability of the state tax commission heretofore to anticipate state expenditures and make approximately uniform levies, the levy this year, according to figures given out by the commission will be the largest in the history of the state. The total assessed valuation of the state is \$254,232,374, an increase of \$19,270,699 over last year, and, despite this increase, there will be a levy of at least 5 mills as against a levy of 4.45 mills last year.

Ship Ashore; Five of Crew Rescued.

Aberdeen, Wash.—Pounding on pieces just outside the Grays Harbor Jetty, a four masted schooner went ashore, and five members of her crew were rescued after passing many hours clinging to the rigging, to which they were driven by the terrific sea which sent the vessel on the beach and placed all in great peril.
