People in the News

Mr. and Mrs. Sayre have arrived in Paris on their wedding tour. Mrs. Sayre is daughter of President Wilson. Commissioner-General of Immigration Caminetti is out to succeed the late John H. Marble, an member of the interstate commerce commission. Representative Brenner of New York is said to be improving as result of treatment of cancer by radium method.

War should be the last recourse between nations, said Secretary of State William J. Bryan, addressing an audience at Lincoln, Neb. He urged men to live, not to die for their country.

Democrats in the New York assembly blocked attempts of Assemblyman and ex-Governor Sulzer for an inquiry into acts of impeachment of himself. The rumor is afloat that President Wilson is considering the plan of appointing ex-President Taft chief justice of the United States supreme court to succeed Chief Justice White on the latter's retirement.

Dr. John Grant Lyman, the Panama land promoter, received a penitentiary sentence of 15 months in the United States district court at Los Angeles for having used the mails to defraud. The Segnatura tribunal, the high court of the Roman Curia, rejected the appeal of the Duchess de Talleyrand (formerly Anna Gould, of New York) from the verdict of the Rota tribunal annulling her marriage to her first husband, Count Boni de Castellane.

WEST WON'T INTERFERE

Says Trouble Merely Squabble Between Mayor and Council.

The Dalles, Or.—Governor West's declaration that he will not come to The Dalles because the trouble here, he says, is merely a squabble between Mayor Anderson and the council, has caused excitement over the matter to die out, and now citizens are merely interested and much relieved.

Following the action of the councilmen in refusing to confirm any of the mayor's nine appointees for the office of chief of police, Anderson said he would bring in "outside help," meaning the state militia.

African Colonies Under Martial Law. Pretoria.—Sixty thousand militia were called out because of the alarming spread of the railway strike and the Transvaal and Orange River Colonies were placed under martial law.

Girls Starve But Won't Be Servants. Los Angeles.—Although they say they are starving and want work, nearly all of the girls and women registered at the municipal employment bureau turn down every offer of domestic service.

Big Steel Plant Reopens.

Wheeling, W. Va.—The Riverside plant of the United States Steel Corporation has resumed operations in full after an idleness of four months. Approximately 5000 men are affected.

Brief News of the Week

Of about 11,000 Texas children examined during 1913, 46.3 per cent had hookworm, according to the annual state hookworm report.

The United States forest service is experimenting with ammonia bombs for extinguishing forest fires.

The Iowa state conference of the Progressive party, after a two days' session, declared itself opposed to amalgamation with any other party. The United States stands second among the powers in the matter of naval expenditures for last year. Great Britain leads. Seven great countries expended \$797,948,000.

Sixty-six state institutions of California will use the parcel post exclusively for transporting freight which amounts to \$40,000 to \$50,000 annual charges.

Board of education of Chicago discontinued practice of teaching sex hygiene in the schools until the people have had a chance to vote on the question.

In the two years since the Wisconsin workmen's compensation law went into effect, employers of the state have paid \$396,534.53 as indemnity to injured workmen and their dependents.

Brick red hair, green coats and cork screw skirts are to be the new vogue for women, according to a New York man milliner who has been style hunting in Paris.

State Game Warden Finley aiding, in an advisory capacity, Max Muller, of Portland, will purchase a number of song birds abroad for use in propagating the wild species in the Oregon woods.

Baker was the scene of a unique Christmas celebration when 600 school children stood in nine inches of snow in the open streets and participated in Yuletide ceremonies before a great Christmas tree.

A course of lectures on infant science dealing with problems of children up to the age of six will be given at the Parents Education Bureau, Portland, beginning Friday, January 2, and continuing each week thereafter, until June 7.

Being desirous of seeing Alaska properly represented, Senator Chamberlain will introduce a bill providing for the appropriation of \$250,000 to enable suitable exhibits of Alaska products to be made at the San Francisco and San Diego expositions.

Just four hours after she appeared in her sketch at the Majestic Theater at Roseburg, Mrs. Al Overton gave birth to a son. Mr. Overton is of Indian blood and says the new arrival is entitled to a 160-acre tract of land in the Roseburg reservation.

The problem of the unemployed in eastern Oregon, which is acute at present, will be relieved by the commencement of actual construction work on the first 10,000 acre unit of the west Unatilla extension irrigation project.

For leading five hungry and unemployed men into a Portland restaurant where they obtained food without paying for same, Municipal Judge Stevenson sentenced Wayne R. Jones to five days on the rockpile.

J. Thorburn Ross, president of the Title Guarantee and Trust company, which failed in Portland in 1907, who was convicted of misappropriating state funds and sentenced to the penitentiary, has been given a full pardon by Governor West. Ross never served a day of his sentence.

Looking the nervous wreck that he has become since he was found guilty of polygamy, E. E. C. Von Klein appeared in circuit court at Portland and received a sentence of imprisonment from one to four years in the penitentiary, the severest penalty provided.

The Eugene charter commission has rejected the whole report of the research commission, which recommended that the present charter be entirely superseded by a new document, and that the new charter be based upon the managerial system of government.

Appeal in the Salem brewery case, wherein Judge Galloway of the Marion county circuit court held that the prohibition charter amendment voted at the city election December 1 was illegal, has been filed in the supreme court by attorneys for the city of Salem.

"Strawberry" was the name given to a new voting precinct created by the county court of Linn county. The precinct adjoins the city limits of Lebanon on the south, east and west sides and in deference to the prominence of Lebanon as a strawberry center this name was assigned.

In view of the early completion of the Panama canal and prospective greater activity in naval matters on the Pacific coast, Senator Chamberlain will introduce a bill on the re-assembling of congress for a \$2,500,000 appropriation to build a drydock on the Columbia river.

People at Pendleton are urging that congress increase the appropriation for their public building from \$70,000 to \$130,000. Of the original sum, \$8000 was spent for a site. They say the building should accommodate the courts as well as the postoffice.
