CO-OPERATION MEANS A GREATER ONTARIO

Dear Editor:—In last article on co-operation mention was made as to a certain business system or plan of co-operation. The system principally referred to is the certificate or check as a medium of exchange between its members. It will be obvious to the average mind unhampered by money prejudice that in localities favored as Ontario with an abundance of fertile soil and proper climatic conditions for the production of various commodities in abundance should be without manufacturing industries in the lines mentioned. All of which and others which might be mentioned could be successfully carried on by the citizens in and around Ontario under this plan without waiting for Ontario to become a railroad center, or waiting for some outside, or other individual concern or company to locate and conduct same for private profit. This is not a new scheme it has been practiced for years in different places in this country. The writer speaks from experience.

This system of co-operation gives the same opportunity to the man without means or money, willing to work as it gives to those better supplied with worldly goods, to become a useful member, and receive customary wages therefor and as the same time become a permanent stockholder through the profits of his labor in the association. Building materials, commodities, produce and useful articles of every description for which no other market may be found or which may lie idle in stores or yards on account of an inactive market or lack of money, maybe contributed at market value of same and certificates or checks issued to owner thereof, such checks do not draw interest, in fact this sort of co-operative enterprise does not in any way bind or obligate itself by interest bearing notes mortgage or lien to any one outside or inside the association. But outstanding checks

are always redeemable by the commodities in its keeping for services or labor performed by the association or its members. All work performed for the association is likewise paid for in certificates. Never in money, except in shipments or where checks cannot well be tendered. Members must obligate themselves through contract to receive said certificate or checks in full satisfaction for contributions or work performed and relinquish all other claims or liens against the association, being organized with the necessary board of directors and by laws in accordance with its Constitution.

The object of this association would be to take up and carry on any enterprise or industry adapted to the locality and to provide work for as many members as possible. Having here laid down a rough outline of the principles of this sort of Co-operation the writer stands ready to give further explanation in details of same if interest can be aroused. C.J.L.

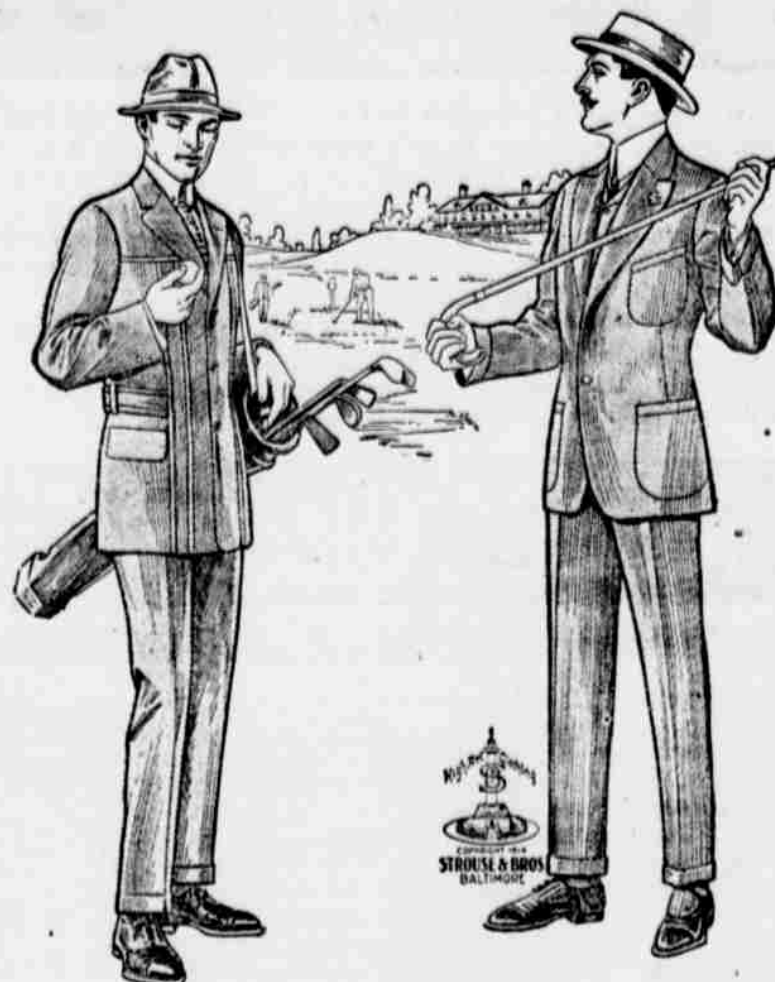
