Assessed against any individual property owner shall equal or exceed the sum of \$25.00 such property owner may at any time, within ten days from the date of this notice, file with the City Recorder an application to pay such assessment in installment, said installments payable yearly for ten years with interest at six per cent; provided, however, that no such application shall be received and filed by the City Recorder if the amount of such assessment with any previous assessments for street improvements or sewer, assessed against the same property and remaining unpaid, shall equal or exceed the valuation of said property as shown by the last tax roll of the county. Said application must be made upon the written form provided for that purpose, which may be secured by applying to the City Recorder.

THE NEW CHARTER AND AND SOME OBJECTIONS

An election was held last Thursday on the adoption of a new charter for the city and it carried by a vote of 223 for, 132 against and three spoilt ballots.

A meeting of the council was held and the returns checked up.

The new charter differs from the old principally in that it covers the enlarged area of the city and conforms to the many changes made in the state laws since the old charter was adopted.

Several peculiar ideas got around about the charter and what it was going to do. There is a clause covering the present bridge across the Snake river, which was construed by some to mean that there was going to be another bridge built. There was some opposition to the city looking after the City Cemetery, but this was done at the request of the orders controlling the cemetery, and will be the means of making the place a credit to the city. The features of the old charter providing for the improvement of streets and sidewalks were incorporated in the new and found some opposition.

The finishing work on the new home for the Ontario National Bank will soon be completed. The marble floor is laid and the wainscoting is being placed. The mahogany fixtures are in place. When the marble is set then the carpenter and painter jobs will be finished in a few days.

Many of the homes around Fruitland are having improvements added in the way of new porches and additional rooms.

Bonds have been voted for a \$12,000 school at New Plymouth and the contract let. The Valley View school is also being improved.

IMPERIAL COUPLE SHOT BY STUDENT

Serajevo, Bosnia.—Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir to the throne of Austria-Hungary, and the Princess of Eichenberg, his morganatic wife, were shot dead by a student in the main street of the Bosnian capital a short time after they had escaped death from a bomb hurled at the royal auto.

The archduke was struck full in the face and the princess was shot through the abdomen and throat. They died a few minutes after reaching the palace, to which they were hurried with all speed.

Those responsible for the deed took care that it should be effective, as there were two assaults, the first with a bomb and the second with a revolver. The bomb was thrown at the royal automobile as it was proceeding to the town hall, where a reception was to be held. The archduke saw the missile hurtling through the air and warded it off with his arm. It fell outside the car and exploded, slightly wounding two aides-de-camp in a second car and half a dozen spectators.

It was on the return of the procession that the tragedy was added to the long list of those that have darkened the pages of the recent history of the Hapsburgs. As the royal machine reached a prominent point in the route to the palace an eighth-grade student, Gavrio Prinzip, sprang out of the crowd and poured a deadly fusillade of bullets from an automatic pistol at the archduke and princess.
