## BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Josephine, Douglas, Klamath and Jackson counties will cooperate in installing a display at the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco.

Outlook for the walnut crop in the McMinnville district is exceptionally good this year, one tree which is 14 years old having a crop which will produce \$40.

Attorney-General Crawford, in an opinion, holds that delinquency certificates could not be issued by county tax collectors until the expiration of six months after taxes became delinquent.

Minnaced and chained, H. A. Miller, mayor of Bend, was marched through the streets and later escorted to the stage of a moving picture theater and there exhibited to a crowded house as a prospective bridegroom.

State Forester Elliott announces the privately-owned stumpage of the state is 9,543,645 acres and that 4,300,130 acres are owned by non-residents. He said that 94 per cent of the timber owners have holdings of about 640 acres each and that they amount to 29 per cent of the total privately-owned forest acreage of the state.

The poultry department of the Oregon Agricultural College shipped to the poultry department of the State Insane asylum 100 pullets of the famous egg strain to be used partly for demonstration work in poultry breeding. These pullets have a pedigree declared to be better than that of any other flock of pullets in the world.

A. M. Gooch, a Hood River orchardist, has obtained record returns from his strawberry crop this year and heads the list for production among those shipping through the Apple Growers' association. From a five-acre tract, with berries planted between apple rows, Mr. Gooch shipped 1117 crates, receiving \$1500.

State Forester Elliott has announced that the federal government would cooperate this year with his department by appropriating \$19,000 for use in patrolling timber lands at the headwaters of navigable streams. The forester said that the money would be used when the danger from fire appeared to be greatest. It will provide about 60 fire-fighters.

Frank Meredith, secretary of the Oregon State Fair, announces that the special prize for the dairy exhibits this year would be much more costly and numerous than ever before in the history of the association. The prizes were obtained by A. H. Lea, superintendent of the department, who has written to Mr. Meredith that he expects to add more prizes to the list which already has been forwarded to him.

The postoffice department has accepted the proposal of the Southern Pacific company to carry parcel post by boat between Portland by North Bend to Marshfield and back as often as the contractor may operate the boats at the rate of 2 cents per pound. The proposal of Oscar F. Jacobsen to transport mail by boat between Newport and Yaquina station has been accepted.

The Benton county court has authorized Sam H. Moore, of Corvallis, to represent the county at the Good Roads convention at Medford the last of this month. Mr. Moore is the originator of a plan to use convict labor in the manufacture of road materials, state roads also to receive labor, so far as available. He advocates the purchase by the state of a shale and rock or cement deposit, the building of a cement plant and the operation of the plant with convict labor. He believes that the convicts will be doing labor not likely to be done by paid labor.

In addition to increasing by \$60,000 the cost limit of the Pendleton post-office building, the senate has passed the bill appropriating \$100,000 for two fish culture stations on the Columbia river in Oregon. The senate also passed the bill appropriating \$50,000 to establish a fishery experiment station at some point on the Pacific coast to be designated by the secretary of commerce, and the bill appropriating \$1200 for Thomas Coyle on account of the death of his child Mar. 10, 1887, caused by a blast of powder at the Cascade Locks, incident to the construction of the canal. A bill was passed authorizing officials of the Olalla diking district in Olalla Slough, Lincoln county, Oregon.

All efforts of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church to wage a fight for prohibition in the northwest will be centered in Oregon next fall, if plans embodied in two sets of resolutions adopted by the synod of the Presbyterian church of Oregon at Eugene are carried out. That body endorsed the Anti-Saloon League, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and the Presbyterian prohibition organization, but refused its support to the prohibition party and instead requested that the National temperance committee of the general assembly place in the hands of a local committee the greater part of \$50,000 at the disposal of that assembly committee for the fight on the coast, for use in this state alone.

### Brief News of the Week

The supreme court of Nevada upheld the law requiring non-residents to reside in the state one year before being eligible for a divorce.

Farmers of Kansas will receive more than \$100,000,000 for their wheat alone this year, says Darius Miller, president of the Burlington railroad, at Chicago.

Four thousand cases of ammunition and 8000 cases of rifles were landed at Dublin, Ireland, for the Irish national volunteers who succeeded in catching the police off their guard.

Six hundred and ninety-six marriage licenses were issued in San Francisco during the month of June just ended, breaking all records for a single month, it is said.

Five men attempted to rob the Bank of British North America at Kaslo, B. C. They arrived in a speed launch on Kootenay lake, but the police were too quick for them. The men escaped in their boat.

The proposals of the leads of the affiliated unions to end the strike of the 7000 men employees of the Westinghouse concerns in Pittsburg, were rejected by the workers in mass meeting. The strike will be continued.

The flying boat America, built by Rodman Wanmaker for flight across the Atlantic ocean, made an ascent with seven passengers, the total weight carried being 5999 pounds. The craft was piloted by Glen Curtiss, the veteran aviator.

The health authorities at New Orleans believed that they had the bubonic plague situation well in hand. The infected district was being carefully watched but it was believed there would be no spread of the disease. Relentless war was being waged on rats.

Fire, the cause of which is a mystery, completely destroyed the Oceanic dock, a quarter of a mile northwest of the O. W. R. & N. shops at Portland, Or., entailing a property loss estimated at \$150,000.

Foreign Markets. New York.—Discrimination in favor of American shipping in customs and canal tolls, rather than in direct subsidies, was advocated by Representative Oscar W. Underwood, of Alabama, in an address in Brooklyn.

The problem confronting the country, he said, is over-production in most industries, and foreign markets must be found for the excess of production.

\$15,000 is Loss in Fire at Stevensop. Stevensop, Wash.—The biggest fire in the history of Stevensop occurred at 3 o'clock Sunday morning, when a block of buildings on Cascades avenue was burned to the ground. The buildings were occupied by a hotel, barber shop, two pool rooms, two saloons and one restaurant. The losses aggregate \$15,000.

### BILL WILL PROFIT U. A. G.

Oregon Will Receive \$10,000 For Educational Extension Work.

Under the provisions of the Smith-Lever bill recently passed by congress, Oregon will receive \$10,000 for educational extension work in agricultural and domestic economy to be carried on during the next year. The money is appropriated for use through the land grant colleges in each state, and therefore will be administered in this state by the Oregon agricultural college. The money became available July 1, or as soon thereafter as the work has been outlined and approved by the United States department of agriculture. The plan of operation has already been prepared by the college officials and forwarded to Washington for approval.

If the plans outlined by the college are finally approved \$5500 of the fund will be used to carry instruction by means of field demonstrations and advice and assistance to individual farmers. The college experts will be sent into certain communities where they will make a survey, call on the farmers, help them to solve their problems as they meet them on the various farms; carry on demonstrations in orchards and fields and hold frequent meetings for the more extensive discussion of the common community problems with the people of the respective districts.

Bar Being Surveyed. The men are here to make a survey of the Sluslaw bar to ascertain the effect of work which has been done on the jetty here. Soundings of the bar taken by boats passing over it show an increase in the depth of the channel of from four to six feet.

Desperate Crook Taken by Officer. Eugene.—John Bodgen, alias John A. Harmon, said to be one of the most dangerous criminals on the Pacific coast, was captured here by the deputy sheriff of Woodland county, Cal., and railroad detectives. They have been following the man for several weeks.

Many Check Signatures. Salem.—Secretary of State Olett has a special corps of men checking over the signatures to the petitions for initiative and referendum necessary that negative arguments be filed until July 21.

Alone With Date "1821" on Shell. Newton, N. J.—Joseph E. White, a farmer of Walnut Corners, caught a turtle on his farm and on taking it to the house examined the shell and found on it the initials "J. E." and the date "1821." White said the initials are his grandfather's. His father caught the same turtle with the same initials in the same field many years ago, and he believes the turtle has not stirred out of the field in the last century.
