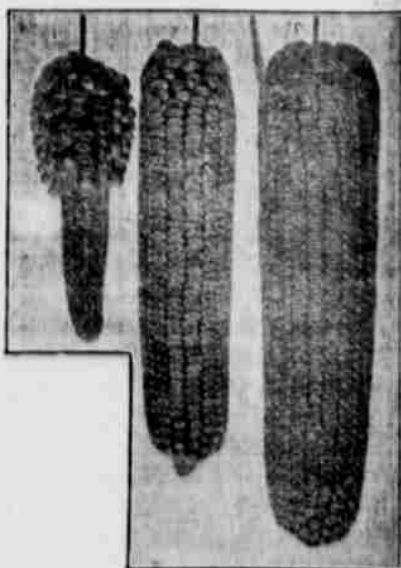
Mrs. F. W. Swank and two little girls moved to Payette last week where they will make their home.

NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST IN IDAHO

Important Occurrences Of The Past Week From Cities In Our State

Power Rivals Are Halted.

Boise.—The climax to the hydro-electric power war which has waged in Southern Idaho for years before four great power corporations whose capitalization runs into several millions, was reached here when the Public Utilities Commissioner denied the Beaver company the right to enter the Pocatello electrical field to supply consumers, and the Idaho Power & Light company to enter the Twin Falls Shoshone, Buhl, Gooding and Wendell fields. The commission also barred the Clear Lake Power & Improvement company from the Twin Falls field.

The Great Shoshone and Twin Falls Land & Water company is in control of the Twin Falls, Wendell and Shoshone fields and by the ruling holds exclusive control. The Southern Idaho Power company is in control of the Pocatello field. The Commission holds that to permit rival competition in the big Southern Idaho territory when other companies are now in control of it with their rates lowered and regulated by the Commission would be ruinous and against the intent of the law.

Twin Falls Aids Belgians.

Twin Falls.—Arrangements were completed here by Secretary McMillan, of the Twin Falls Commercial Club, co-operating with the local organization of the Red Cross Society, to send money, food and clothing to the Belgians. About \$600 in cash has been subscribed in Twin Falls alone. Nearly 15 carloads of potatoes may be increased to 25.

IDAHO REPUBLICANS AHEAD

Late Returns Give Party Control of Next Legislature.

Boise.—The republicans will control the next legislature of this state, according to returns complete from the 33 counties, having elected 19 senators and 33 representatives.

To control the senate 17 senators are needed and to control the house 31 representatives. The republicans have both. The democrats elected 11 senators and 26 representatives, the progressives 2 senators and 1 representative and the socialists 1 senator.

On strictly party issues the republicans will have no trouble in the legislature. Their main worry will be with the new governor, who is a democrat. Likewise he will be handicapped in putting through his policies with a republican legislature.

Senator John Hart, now of Jefferson county, formerly of Fremont county, president pro tem and "whip" of the senate, was re-elected. Other senators sent back include E. M. Pugmire of Bear Lake county; Nathan Ricks, of Madison county; Ravenel Macbeth, of Custer county and E. S. Sweet, of Idaho county. Ex-representatives elected to the senate include E. E. Elliott, of Bonner county, W. H. Mendenhall, of Bannock county and James Johnson, of Franklin county. Representatives re-elected include A. H. Conner, of Bonner county, W. H. Edelblute, of Kootenai county, Abe L. Harchelrode, of Idaho county, C. G. Koelsch, of Ada county, D. J. Law, of Bannock county, W. L. Shattuck, of Bonneville county, P. G. Johnson, of Bingham county, Robert Gilchrist of Jefferson county.

The republican party is pledged to enact a state-wide prohibition bill. Early returns indicated the legislature might be democratic but late returns from all counties show the republicans are in control.

Latest figures in the race for justice of the supreme court give W. M. Morgan a lead of 400 over his opponent, C. A. Walters, and practically assuring his election.

That it will require an official count to determine the election as lieutenant governor of Herman H. Taylor, republican, or James W. Tanner, democrat, now seems certain.

Attorney General Peterson, republican, looks certain of election. His total is now 34,182 to 33,379 for Walters, democrat.

Woman Begg Off Grand Jury Duty. Moscow.—When the federal court was convened here by Judge Frank S. Dietrich it developed that one woman had been summoned on the regular panel of grand jury, Mrs. S. L. Richmond of Culesac, a former post-mistress, and after expressing desire to be excused, Judge Dietrich stated that as she was the only woman on the list and the nature of the work of a grand jury required them to be together in one room, excused Mrs. Richmond.

This was the first time in the history of the federal court here that a woman has appeared as a member of the federal grand jury.
