recently completed. Plans of the state C. M. Gardner, Assistant State project never were sent to Washington for inspection or approval, nor has the Interior Department or Reclamation Service been advised from time to time as to the progress made with the Train state work.

Rather, the Secretary said, the state has built the Tumalo project as an independent state enterprise, and had Governor West and State Engineer Lewis regarded that project as part of the co-operative scheme, he thought they certainly would have advised with government engineers and authorities from time to time.

However, after hearing all that Senator Chamberlain and Representative Sinnott had to say, Secretary Lane announced his willingness to withdraw the condition he suggested should be attached to the appropriation to be made by Congress, and if the irrigation committee, after hearing all the facts, is willing to make an unconers' Association, which meets at the ditional appropriation of \$450,000, or State University on Deceember 21 to even more, for building a new irrigation project in Eastern Oregon, he will approve that proposal.
