UNION TABERNACLE MEETINGS POPULAR

Good Singing, Good Preaching, Good Lectures, Good Prayer Meetings.
The Union Tabernacle meetings are still attracting great crowds and every evening the room is pretty well filled, while on special nights the seats are crowded. Rev. Haudenschild is a forceful and pointed speaker and deals fearlessly with local conditions. Last Sunday afternoon he spoke to a crowded house of men only. It was a sermon handled in a masterful way. All of last Sunday's sermons were to the point. Monday night the subject for discussion was "Popular Amusements." The saloons, cards, theatre and dances, were taken up in turn. Some of his remarks were as follows:—"The dance keeps more women out of the kingdom than anything else." "Seven out of ten of all gamblers started at the social card table." "If the preacher in the pulpit was as impure and low as the average player in the theatre you would run him out of town." "God will have to fumigate the tobacco user some place between earth and heaven if he lets him in."
Tuesday night he spoke on "The Unpardonable Sin," and impressed his subject very strongly on the audience.
Sunday night a proposed petition protesting against "drawing the teeth" of the prohibition law, was read to the audience and a vote taken. It was almost unanimously adopted and sent to the congressman from this district. A canvass was taken last week to get the religious condition of the town and some interesting facts were reported.
The Bible lectures and cottage prayer meetings are continued each week with marked success.
The chorus led by Mr. Pugh has made an excellent impression and the leader is well pleased. There are sixty-five chairs on the platform for the singers and they are full nearly every night and nearly full every night.
The results of the meeting can not be expressed in numbers as the number of people that come to the altar does not tell the whole story. So far, about one hundred and fifty persons have signified their intention of leading a Christian life. This does not include the children that came forward at the Sunday afternoon meeting two weeks ago.
The expenses of the meeting are pretty nearly taken care of at this time and this alone speaks well of their popularity.
